WELCOME TO THE NEW AGE ISSUE OF THE PRIDE OF PENNSYLVANIA!


Pennsylvania Lions have moved into the New Age of technology with this issue of The Pride. It is our hope that you will like what you see. The color throughout should be a welcome change.

Ain't life funny

Written by 14-N IVDG Erwin "Chip" Campbell, the message is the same as delivered by Helen Keller many years ago: "Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much."

Every once in a while, things converge in such an odd way, you have to wonder, "ain't life funny." The other day I had a doctor's appointment in the morning; after I got out, I drove around the Giant Eagle parking lot, twice, debating, really. I was agonizing, if I should stop and buy some ankle high white socks or not. I have 18 new pairs of calf high socks, but no new ankle height ones, and the ones I do have, have seen better days. Anyway, to make a long story long, I stopped in Peebles and purchased the socks; as I was waiting to check out, the woman in front of me was complaining that her house and her neighbors' houses got flooded, and this was four days later and they still had no help. They approached the Red Cross, Salvation Army and called the county authorities. Four days into it they still had no relief. Naturally, I offered to come down and see if there was anything the Lions could do to help. Ain't life funny, two minutes either way and I would have missed the opportunity to help.

I thought the first thing they could use was a dumpster. I called my club and we pledged money to the clean-up effort. The dumpster was ordered within one hour of leaving the flood area and they had some cleaning supplies in hand as quickly. Our donation got us a 30-yard dumpster, with a few bucks to spare for other supplies. The dumpster came two days later and was full two days after that. It made me feel great that we could

act that quickly and let them know there is help around, if there are Lions around.

There are more "ain't life funny" moments, coming.

Not knowing how wide-spread the damage was I asked if there were other people in the area who might need help. I was pointed to a young family who lost their husband and father this last year; the mother had three daughters and a son at home yet. When I asked the name of the family and was told what it was, for some reason that name rang a bell. A-ha! I know, we had just picked her daughter as one of our scholarship winners the previous Wednesday. They are going to get a double dose of Lions' caring. I don't know, but to me that sounds like "ain't life funny." It made me feel good that we could respond so quickly and at least let them know help was available. On my trips back and forth to the flood area, there was a house I passed with a lot of trash out front, I stopped a few times, but couldn't get in touch with the home owner. Finally, I saw the door open and a car out front, so I stopped and left a message with the daughter to have her mother call and we would haul her trash away while we had the dumpster. When she returned my call, it turns out we awarded her son a scholarship four years earlier. "Ain't life funny." That's all I'm saying about "ain't life funny."

Shortly after, I had the pleasure of installing officers at the Chippewa Lions, I mentioned the opportunity we had to help some people who had flood damage, and without missing a beat, they donated to our effort. Feels so good when you don't have to ask. Ah! the dilemma, we had extra money to buy things, but what was needed was another dumpster, currently out of our budget. So, I called on two Riverside grads, Rita Swesey, of Rochester-Beaver Lions, and Bill Campbell from Beaver Falls Lions, to see if their clubs would care to donate half each of what we needed. I was also in contact with Jim Groff and Ed Baylor from the Pa Lions Disaster Relief Foundation, for their input. While waiting for a reply, Lynn mentioned to our daughter, Brandi, how much was needed, and she and her husband, Brian Smith, donated what was needed. We then received word from Rochester-Beaver and Beaver Falls that both clubs had decided to help. We now had some extra money to help fill the victims' needs as they move forward. Ain't life funny, the amount of people's lives we can touch, when we practice "We Serve." All you need to do is keep your eyes, and ears, open and opportunity will rear its head.



ACTION ITEMS SUMMARY

- Approved minutes of the fourth 2018-2019 State Council meeting and 2019 state convention meetings held at Kalahari Resorts & Conventions in Pocono Manor. Pa.
- Endorsed Philadelphia Convention & Visitors Bureau's bid to host the 2027 LCI Convention.
- Authorized State Administrator Lion Bob McComas to continue discussions with representatives from Kalahari Resorts & Conventions
 Poconos, the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau and/or Erie Events related to the possibility of Pennsylvania hosting the 2024
 USA/Canada Lion Leadership Forum.
- Approved 2019-2020 PA Lions All State Band budget.
- Re-appointed Lion Allison Kline (Tamaqua Lions Club, District 14-U) to serve a three-year term as Eastern Representative on the PA Lions All State Rand Committee.
- Tabled recommendation from MD-14 Constitution & By Laws/Policy Committee to establish State Policy 213, Committee on Committees;

Dear Fellow Lions,

In a recent newsletter from the Westmoreland County Food Bank, I was saddened to read this story:

At lunchtime, while most of her classmates were diving into their lunchboxes, Sophia sat quietly with an unopened brown paper bag on her lap.

After days of the little girl saying she wasn't hungry, a teacher became concerned and opened the girl's lunch bag to see a crumpled ball of newspaper inside.


Sophia put it into the bag to make it appear that she had food inside. Her family was struggling, and food was scarce, but she was too ashamed to admit she had no lunch.

How unfortunate, that here in Pennsylvania in 2019, children are starving! In fact, Pennsylvania ranks ninth in having the greatest number of children who live in poverty (444,486). Nearly 3.5% of the families in MD-14 have incomes that are below \$10,000/year while 12.5% of our state's population lives in poverty!

Why do we need members? We need more hands to help children like Sophia. Thanks to those clubs that work hard to supply food to school-aged children on weekends. Unfortunately, those programs don't reach those who are not yet in school, or those grandparents who have found themselves caring for grandchildren and extended families, due to unforeseen circumstances.

Likewise, as we complete the first quarter of this Lions year, we are asked to consider the progress we have made toward our goals:

- Have we attracted new members?
- Are we keeping our present members happy?
- Have we provided orientation for ALL of our members? (Everyone can benefit from this.)
- Have we visibly provided service within our communities?



Thanks for all that you do to serve others who need help. Together, we can, and will, improve lives.

Edwards' election in Milan signals end, start of "IDLE Time" in MD-14

For most Pennsylvania residents, this is football season, "fall" ... or the dreaded "Road Construction Season."

For a select group of likeminded individuals in the Keystone State, though, this is also the end, and the start, of "idle" time. But not in the sense of the word you might imagine.

It's the end of "idle time" in the sense that, for the first time since 2015, Pennsylvania – or Multiple District 14, as it's better known in the world's largest civic service organization – has an elected representative on the Lions Clubs International Board of Directors.

Until now, a Pennsylvania Lion has not served as an official member of the LCI board since Cindy Gregg of Belle Vernon completed her two-year term as an International Director at the conclusion of the 98th International Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii.

This is also the start of "IDLE Time," thanks to the election in early July at the 102nd Annual Lions Clubs International Convention in Milan, Italy of MD-14 Past State Council Chairperson Larry L. Edwards as an International Director.

OK, you ask, how does that translate to "IDLE Time?" The answer: It's the start of International Director Larry



Edwards' Time in the spotlight as MD-14's highest-ranked Lion.

The quest for a seat on the International Board began for Director Edwards a little more than a year ago when he and his Partner in Service, Lion Susan – both of whom were recently retired – decided to pursue the position and busy schedule that goes with it. That decision quickly set in motion a series of caucuses and club meetings.

There were more than a few I's that had to be dotted and T's that needed to be crossed, an important first step being the securing of support from the current PA Lions International Family headed by Past International President Joseph L. Wroblewski.

Once the Family's blessing was secured, the first real challenge arose. Because their home sub-district did not meet the LCI requirement (1,250 or more members) for nominating a candidate for international office, Director Edwards and Lion Susan

had to leave their home base, District 14-L in the Altoona-Bedford area, and find a new base of operation.

The transition was a smooth and easy one, though, as the Director and Lion Susan figuratively needed to climb the nearest mountain to the State College area, where they quickly became part of District 14-G, the largest in MD-14.

The next items were just as easily checked off the list:
Endorsement by the board of directors and membership of the Harris Township Lions Club, the Director and Lion Susan's new home club, followed by that of the District 14-G Cabinet and delegates in a special district election.

Director Edwards, the clear-cut hometown favorite, then emerged as the endorsed candidate in the final two preliminary elections. He was the overwhelming choice of delegates at an MD-14 House of Delegates session in November 2018 in

Indiana, Pa., just a few short miles from his Altoona home, and garnered the needed final MD-14 approval during a special statewide election held virtually in his backyard, in Altoona in February 2019.

The final steps in the quest to become an International Director came in late June and early July when Director Edwards received the endorsement of the LCI Executive Committee and was elected as one of six Americans to join the LCI Board as International Directors.

Director Edwards, who will serve a two-year term as International Director that runs through the conclusion of the 104th Annual LCI Convention in Montreal, Ontario, Canada, is part of a 12-man USA contingent on the LCI Board. He is joined in

that group by former Murrysville/ District 14-B Lion Gary F. Brown, now a resident of Cape Vincent, N.Y., who was elected as an International Director one year ago.

Appointed by current LCI President Dr. Jung-Yul Choi to serve as a member of the Membership Development Committee for this year's LCI board, Director Edwards was the 26th Pennsylvania Lion to be elected as International Director. He joined a group that included two men who later served as LCI's International President. the late Monroe L. Nute (1954-1955) and PIP Wroblewski (1985-1986). Irving L. Camp, the first Pennsylvania to serve as Lions Clubs' International President in 1927-1928, did not serve as an ID prior to becoming the organization's chief executive officer.

We would be remiss if we did not point out that, while MD-14 has not had an elected representative on the LCI Board since 2015, it has not totally been on the sidelines during the LCI decision-making process. PIP Wroblewski has served as an LCI Board Appointee virtually every year since his one-year term as LCI's chief executive officer.

Director Edwards also has the good fortune of having six active MD-14 Past International Directors -- Carl L. Battistone, James A. Cavallaro, Cindy B. Gregg, Robert W. Miller, LeGrand W. Perce III and Gene S. Polgar – on whom to call for input and guidance when needed.

Hand in hand with that, lending valuable advice and guidance to Lion Susan are

Partners in Service of PA International Family members – Ruth Battistone, Michelle Cavallaro, PDG Tom Gregg, Judy Miller and Joan Perce – as well as spouses of PIDs who have passed away: Jakoba Anderson (PID Bill), Rita Fusco (PID Teddy) and Barbara Ott (PID Harold).

Prior to being elected as ID in Milan, Director Edwards served two terms as District 14-L Governor (2010-2011 and 2016-2017), was MD-14 State Council Vice Chair in 2016-2017 and State Council Chair in 2017-2018.

Director Edwards became a Lion in 2005 as a member of the Lakemont Lions Club in District 14-L and served multiple terms as the club's president. He and Lion Susan, who also served multiple terms as Lakemont's King Lion and is a Melvin Jones Fellow and Lion of PA Fellow, transferred their regular memberships to the Harris Township Lions Club in District 14-G at the start of the 2018-2019 Lions year. They retain associate memberships in the Lakemont club.

A Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, Director Edwards has received numerous recognitions, including International President's

Awards. He has also served as president of the Blair County Lions Sight Conservation Foundation.

The role of an International Director according to information on the Lions Clubs International website is to represent a constitutional area, make decisions that are best for the association and serve as a liaison between local Lions and the international association.

Director Edwards is an Eagle Scout and past board member and district chairman for Boy Scouts of America who retired in 2016 after working 45 years in the banking industry. During his career, he directed operational requirements for nine large bank mergers as well as developed new commercial banking product lines and their supporting technologies.

In that light, MD-14 Lions will watch with interest as Director Edwards melds that role with his professional training to pay dividends for Lions Clubs International and in particular his home MD. Among the pet projects for which he will be carrying the PA banner are bids to host the 2027 LCI Convention in Philadelphia and/or 2024 USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in the Pocono Mountains or Erie areas of the state.

"IDLE Time" in the true sense of the phrase is clearly not applicable when it comes to the road ahead for Director Edwards and Lion Susan, but it's a good catchphrase.

In addition to his Lions activities, Director Edwards is a former treasurer of the Blair County United Way and a member of the Blair County Chamber of Commerce.

Patriotism and service to his country holds a special place in Edwards' heart. A retired member of the U.S. Army Pennsylvania National Guard, Director Edwards is a director of the Central Pennsylvania National Guard & Veterans Association. His son, Scott, was a U.S. Army Persian Gulf War veteran who passed away in 2017. Director Edwards and Lion Susan are also the parents of a daughter and son-in-law and grandparents to two teenagers in Nevada.

Fun facts for the trivia buffs:

- Director Edwards' election marked the end of a four-year period during which MD-14 was not represented on the LCI board by an elected International Director, the longest dry spell since a six-year dry spell ended in 1987.
- Prior to PID Gregg's completing her two-year term in 2015, MD-14 had had an elected ID on the LCI Board 21 of the last 28 years.


