



WELCOME TO THE NEW AGE ISSUE OF THE PRIDE OF PENNSYLVANIA!



Summer breezes to Leo of Year honor

Summer Martinez "is a young lady who has demonstrated to her Leo advisors, her teachers, her parents and her friends that she is a person of integrity with high ethical standards."

The words of Carmen Gonzalez, a member of the Penbrook Lions Club and an advisor to the Penbrook Leo Club, capture in a nutshell why Martinez was selected as the 2018-2019 Multiple District 14 Leo of the Year.

In recognition of being selected as Pennsylvania's top Leo, Martinez received a Multiple District Leos Founders Recognition Award, including a \$250 cash prize.

The state winner is selected each year by the PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors from a pool of candidates comprised of first-place finishers in sub-district competitions.

Leos considered for the prestigious award sponsored by Lions Clubs International must demonstrate outstanding leadership skills, achieve a superior record as a Leo in implementing successful service



projects and make an identifiable contribution to the development and growth of the Leo Club Program.

Leo of the Year award winners are also expected to achieve distinction in community or school activities outside of Leo club commitments and demonstrate high ethical standards and personal integrity.

Martinez definitely "checked all the boxes," as the saying goes.

"Despite the teen pressures that surround her daily, Summer has done the right thing for herself and others," Gonzalez wrote as part of her nomination of Martinez for the Leo of the Year honor. "She has never been disciplined for inappropriate behavior, she wears her Leo shirt with pride and encourages the other club members to do likewise," Gonzalez added. "She delegates responsibility fairly, always tries her best to be inclusive of those with lesser abilities or strengths."

"Summer is loved and admired not just by the Leos and advisors, but also by her siblings and friends," Gonzalez added.

The second oldest of Theodore and Ronece Martinez's six children, Summer joined the Penbrook Leo Club in 2012 and immediately made an impression,

"Summer was one of the most energetic and enthusiastic members," said PDG Kathy Fouse, one of the charter advisors of the Penbrook Leo club. "With volunteering and serving others running in her family, I knew from the start she would become a great leader."

PDG Fouse served alongside PDG Sarah Clark and the late Carolyn Cassell as the original advisors to the Penbrook Leo club. Speaking on behalf of them and now as MD-14's Leo coordinator, PDG Fouse said, "I

am truly honored to have one of my former Leos receive this recognition and can only hope that in some small way I had some influence in her path from Leos to Lions."

Martinez served her second one-year term as club president in 2018-2019 after handling the duties of secretary, treasurer, president and vice president successively in the previous five years.

Hand in hand with those responsibilities and the mentoring of leaders who will follow in her footsteps, Martinez was a primary organizer for the Leo club's "Pay It Forward" events including ones that benefitted the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp, Leader Dogs for the Blind and the Manna Food Pantry.

During her first term as President, she organized and implemented the Senior Technology Project in collaboration with the ARC of Dauphin County. That project was designed to help senior citizens have a better understanding of their personal tech devices, such as smartphones or tablets.

Martinez also set the tone for the club's commitment to the Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful Adoption of a segment of the Capital Area Greenbelt in the Penbrook/Paxtang area of Harrisburg and the Greenbelt Native Plants & Erosion Project. Her efforts paved the way for the Leo club to receive a Capital Area Greenbelt Association "Volunteer Service Award" in 2017.

One of the organizers of the club's "Membership Drive Movie Night" project, Martinez sponsored nine new members during her six-year Leo career. And the additions were not members in name only; three of the members she sponsored have gone on to serve as a club vice president, two served as club chaplain and one as club treasurer.

Martinez "understands and accepts the varied levels of learning for each member. Her patience, persistence and tenacity yield successful results," Gonzalez said.

Martinez was also instrumental in the club's meetings starting one half hour earlier than normal to afford members increased social time, get help with homework or plan projects. "That simple change has proven to be one of the most rewarding changes in the club," Gonzalez said. "The club functions more openly and less formally, allowing for supportive camaraderie."

Throughout her Leo career, Martinez consistently earned the "Young Leaders in Service Award" from the Penbrook Lions Club in recognition of devoting more than 100 hours of voluntary service per year to the community. In addition to activities previously listed, Martinez has been active in children's Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween and holiday tree lighting, Hunters & Anglers Youth Field Day and Storm Water Authority education and cleanup projects.

And, as if that's not enough, Martinez, a member of Student Council and her local Red Cross Club, also served as a math and Spanish tutor at Central Dauphin East Middle and Senior high schools and volunteered with the Southside Elementary School May Fair.

Since 2016, she has been a youth member of the Penbrook Borough Parks Subcommittee involved in the revitalization of Elm Street Station Park and the Little Valley Park

Summer Program. She received the Mosby Leadership Award in recognition of her dedicated volunteer service to the children of the Penbrook summer program.

As a member of the parks subcommittee, Martinez, in conjunction with fellow Penbrook Leo Mary Dougherty, took the lead in developing and conducting a youth survey. Those efforts resulted in the borough securing grants for the Elm Street Station Park project, including one for a technology-based hub located in the park.

Martinez's dedication to community service earned her the "Youth Volunteer of the Year Award" from Penbrook Borough Council in October 2018.

A 2019 graduate of Central Dauphin East High School, Martinez plans to begin attending Harrisburg Area Community College in January with an intended field of concentration in nursing.

In September 2019, when she joined the Penbrook Lions Club, Martinez became the fourth member of the Penbrook Leo Club to complete the Leo-to-Lion transition.

Ashley Cramer, who later served as a member of the borough council, blazed the trail when, after being a Leo for four years, she joined the parent club in 2013.

Emily Miller, a third-generation Lion, joined the Penbrook Leo Club in 2009 and became a Lower Paxton Township Lion in 2015. She is the daughter of District 14-T PDG Salli Miller and granddaughter of 14-T PDG Fouse.

Mary Dougherty, a secondgeneration Lion, was a member of the Penbrook Leo Club from 2010 through July 2017, when she completed her Leo-to-Lion transition and joined the Penbrook Lions Club, in which she remains a member. She is the daughter of Penbrook Lions First Vice President Vicki and treasurer Jeff Dougherty, who both also serve as advisors of the Penbrook Leo club.

International Board of Directors approves dues adjustment resolution

The following message was emailed 11/20/19 by International President Dr. Ing-Yul Choi to Council Chairpersons, District Governors, Vice District Governors id Past District Governors and is being shared here to help assure the message aches all MD-14 Lions:

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and nembers around the world so we can advance our lobal mission of service together. Our international apport and the work of Lions Clubs International fueled by the international dues of our incredible nembers.

At the International Board f Directors meeting in October, ne Board voted to approve an iternational dues adjustment esolution that will be voted on at ne International Convention in ingapore in 2020.

In recent years, it has become icreasingly clear that the services ions Clubs International has been ble to provide to members with the vailable budget is no longer in line 7th what Lions need and expect.

The Board of Directors ndertook an extensive review of Lions lubs International's financials, including the nplementation of substantial budget reductions. After such consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues y US\$3 effective July 2021, raising dues to US\$46, sen adjusted annually for U.S. inflation thereafter. We fill use a three-year inflation average not to exceed .0% or be lower than 1.5%.

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant adjust dues over the years, and we have not djusted international dues since 2011. The proposed djustment will help cover our costs and allow us to aitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the loard of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor re we minimizing the value of each dollar that our nembers contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is ssential that we keep in mind that our global efforts

and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 48,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and

to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as a new online learning platform, development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and others tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.



Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see.

We need you to help our members and leaders understand why this adjustment is needed. We have developed an international dues adjustment FAQ and PPT to help you present it to your Lions.

I hope that you will see this adjustment as we do: as an investment in the future of Lions. Through your support, we can ensure that Lions are positioned for success in the future.

Welcome to 2020!



Welcome to 2020! The 2019 Holiday season is behind us and I sincerely hope everyone had a relaxing time with family and fellow Lions. I sincerely hope most clubs had a service project to support their communities by providing food to those in need, donating to local charities to help them or your own special way to provide service. Please ensure all your service

projects were input to MyLion by your Club Secretary or Club Global Service Coordinator. Reporting your service is critical to Lions Clubs International in getting matching funds from other foundations that support what we do.

Last year I challenged every Lion, club, and district to step up their donations to many new projects; notably Brady Buggy and the partnership with Four Diamonds. Some of our traditional causes, i.e. Beacon Lodge, Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation, Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation, Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation, Pennsylvania Lions Sight Conservation and Eye Research Foundation, and Leader Dogs for the Blind, suffered because of this, but most notably the Lions Clubs International Foundation. This year I would like to see our Lions, clubs and districts get back to the basics of our Lions giving; support the five Pennsylvania projects.

It's time to support our Foundation, Lions Clubs International Foundation, and in particular Campaign 100, the three-year \$300 million Capital Campaign to boost giving around the world. If each Pennsylvania Lion becomes a \$20 Contributing Member, we would raise over \$345,000 this year; and if each club would donate \$500 this year an additional annual donation of \$336,500 could be made. If additional individual, club and district contributions are added, there is a potential of \$700,000 this year. What a huge impact Pennsylvania could make. See your club's LCIF chairperson, your district LCIF chairperson, or your District Governor for more details.

Lions Clubs International added Childhood Cancer as a Global Service cause last year. Pennsylvania Lions stepped up and raised almost \$70,000 for our partnership with The Four Diamonds Foundation. Clubs also found other childhood cancer organizations and gave generously. Pennsylvania Lions need to

continue with our campaign to support children and families dealing with the devastation of cancer and our desire to eliminate childhood cancer through research. Please continue your donations to The Four Diamonds Foundation and other childhood cancer organizations throughout Pennsylvania. What a huge difference Lions can make in the lives of children with cancer and in aiding their families with expenses.

Leadership. I'm a career military guy with 36 years of service to our soldiers. The military defines leadership as "The process of influencing others to accomplish the mission by providing purpose, direction, and motivation." "Selfless service is defined as putting the needs and goals of the nation, the military, your unit and your soldier ahead of your personal needs and interest." Isn't that akin to what Lions do, also? Our Mission is to serve others. "We Serve." Lions mostly practice Servant Leadership. John Greenleaf defined the Servant Leader as someone with "the desire to serve," the "servant's heart," is a fundamental characteristic of a servant-leader. It is not about being servile, it is about wanting to help others. It is about identifying and meeting the needs of colleagues, customers and communities."

Membership. That terrible word that we tiptoe around. At the time of writing this article we have lost 43 members and four clubs. By the end of December, we could drop about another 100 members and potentially two clubs. We will be under 18,000 members, a far cry from when Pennsylvania had more than 30,000 Lions. Please continue to work on membership with your District GMT, club membership chairpersons, club presidents and all Lions. Lions do a lot of amazing things in our communities, and those communities have learned to depend upon us. What is going to happen in our communities in five, 10, or 20 years if we don't replace ourselves, grow and flourish? Our existing clubs in some cases have attempted to pick up some of the requirements when a club closes but in most cases do not. And our communities suffer. especially those who need us the most – children, seniors and the underprivileged. Each Lion needs to bring one guest, not to a meeting, but to a service project, the club needs to embrace that visitor, talk to them about the club, its services, the good it does for the community; then invite them to a meeting and offer membership. My challenge, each club ends the 2019-2020 Lions year with a plus two, one being a woman to celebrate our organization's first woman president.

Of course, the last minute effort by various clubs and districts to send care packages to our Pennsylvania servicemen and women quarding a volatile area of the world was fantastic! You proved, once again, that "Where There's a Need, There's a Lion." Thank you for all that you do.

Finally, in this new year, I hope that each of your clubs will work toward your district goals of attracting new members, maintaining and involving your present members in relevant service projects, being visible within your communities, and encouraging your members to contribute



to Campaign100. Also, think about areas where we can charter new clubs or specialty clubs to develop a closer bond with those who "share a common interest, hobby, profession, culture, or a common cause." There is room to increase our membership, but we must think differently to grow our Association so that we can continue to provide the outstanding services for which we are known, but we need your help. Growing our Association is the responsibility of EVERY Lion, and I hope that I can count on each of you to strive to achieve this goal.

As always, thank you for "Serving Through Diversity" to ensure that we remain the "most dynamic" service organization in the world.

What electrifies your motivation?

Let's turn the light bulb on . . . Why does one volunteer? Do you know why a new member joined the Lions Club? Was it because she/he wanted to be around people since they are alone at home? Or did the new member join because of one of the five focus areas in Lionism: Cancer? Diabetes? Environment? Hunger? Vision?

Listen to the new member, really listen. Where is their passion for volunteering? Let's say, for example, it was diabetes. Provide the information Lions Clubs International has on this topic: have pamphlets, bookmarks, brochures, and kids' activity booklets available at the club, so one can easily take some information home with them immediately and not wait for the next meeting. Pique their interest and make the connection with Lions as soon as possible.

Supporting their interest will play a major role as an incentive to return to the next meeting. Keep in touch, possibly call the new member to ask if they have any questions. Meet about five minutes before the next meeting begins to follow up personally with the new Lion. These actions will inspire the member to feel a part of the club much sooner.

How about members who have been in your club and appear to enjoy what they are volunteering to do. Ask if they like what they are doing and discuss with them a new avenue to support by going one step further. Help them set personal goals. What are they hoping to achieve for themselves? Give them time to explore and contemplate new roles within the Lions club.

There are opportunities to learn more about Lions in the comfort of their own homes: Lions Learning Center and Lions University. Meet with them one-on-one and work with the MyLion website or have one of your members join you at a local restaurant and work together.

Once they have developed a volunteer career path, guide them to what must happen for it to blossom. For example, if they have an interest in becoming an officer, show them courses in the Learning Center on the responsibilities and duties. Encourage them by working with the club's first or second vice-president, while making connections to potential leadership positions. Guide them with careful consideration on their volunteer journey. Keep the light bulb on!

As Sheri Wilensky Burke simply states in her article of October 2019, "We must ensure that those eager volunteers learn how to delegate to other volunteers, recognize when to say no to a request, and set realistic limits to what can be accomplished in the time frame.

Volunteer engagement leaders need to guide volunteers in practicing self-care and give them the ability to take a step back when needed." If you notice a lack in attendance, take some time to contact the Lion and let them know it is



okay to take a step back – whether for personal reasons or other reasons. One can return motivated when the Lion is ready. Volunteers are special kind-hearted individuals who want to help others.

On a cheerful note, District 14-D converted a Lioness Club to a Lions Club with much success – congratulations!! To the new Lions, may you find a bright journey in Lionism and continue to be strong leaders in fundraising while having fun. You will have more access to funds to assist you in your endless endeavors!

To our District Governors, keep your eyes on the bright side and continue to push forward with adding more Lions to our great organization. Reading from your notes, districts are beginning to set trainings within their districts which is awesome! Help your Lions set volunteer goals while guiding them to reach their full potential of serving others. Invite a friend to help with a fun activity in which your clubs participate – best way to dazzle and create a desire to be part of the action in your community! Recognition in public may be worth the price of an advertisement.

Melvin Jones and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowships



As your MD-14 Lions Clubs International Foundation Coordinators we have heard this comment more than once: "It's a shame we can't present a Melvin Jones Fellowship to Lion "X" for all they have done because he/she already has an MJF." We wish to clarify that this is not true.

A Lion/Lioness/Leo who has been recognized as a MJF is eligible to be presented with additional levels of Fellowships. These are known as Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowships.

For those who are already a Melvin Jones Fellow, the Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship (PMJF) provides an opportunity to advance in the Fellowship program. For each donation of \$1,000, beyond the initial MJF donation, donors receive a new level of recognition, signified by a PMJF pin in accordance with their level of giving. Each level has a unique pin, representing the PMJF level of the Fellow. Like MJFs, donors can honor another individual with PMJF donations.

Perhaps a member of your club was honored decades ago with a Fellowship and continues to serve faithfully years later, or you have a club occasion that is deserving of something special. Presenting a PMJF as a memorial is also common. These are just some examples of situations where it is an opportunity to further recognize a serving individual.


