

Conventions canceled

Regrettably, both the 2020 Lions Clubs International Convention in Singapore and the MD-14 State Convention in Erie were canceled due to concerns and restrictions resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. The next LCI Convention is scheduled to be held on June 25-30, 2021 in Montreal, Quebec, Canada. The next MD-14 State Convention is scheduled for May 13-16, 2021 at the Blair County Convention Center in Altoona. International Convention in Singapore Canceled



Dear Lion,

The Board of Directors has voted to cancel the 2020 Lions International Convention due to concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19). This means that the next International Convention will be held in 2021 in Montreal, Canada.

After evaluating a variety of different options including moving the convention to a different venue or postponing the convention to a later date, the Board of Directors voted to cancel the 2020 convention. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind.

Canceling the International Convention for 2020 impacts international officer continuity and candidate elections. After review of the International Constitution and By-Laws, this impact is outlined below:

- Executive officers and international directors will continue in their respective
 positions until the 2021 convention in Montreal. All candidate elections for
 these positions shall comply with the provisions of the International
 Constitution and By-Laws for election at the convention in Montreal.
- An international director from the areas of Africa and Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia and the Islands of the South Pacific is permitted only in even-numbered years. As a result, no director from Africa or Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia and the Islands of the South Pacific would be eligible for election until the 2022 convention.
- Barring any district election complaints, district governors, first vice district governors and second vice district governors elected during a convention of their respective districts will be accepted by Lions International. The International Board of Directors intends to authorize commencement of the DG terms beginning July 1, 2020.

We are disappointed that we will not be able to move forward with this international event, but we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions we will continue to find new ways to put our kindness in action while safely serving our communities.

The Pennsylvania State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors voted Monday night, April 6, 2020, to cancel the 2020 MD-14 state convention scheduled for May 14-17 at the Bayfront Convention Center in Erie. The decision was made with the health and welfare of PA Lions, Lionesses and Leos and other convention participants in mind during the COVID-19 pandemic.

As soon as possible, the PA Lions state office and 2020 state convention host committee from District 14-F will begin communicating with individuals and organizations on full refunds of prepaid convention registration and other fees. We request your patience as they work through this process.

Thank you for your involvement in the planning of the 2020 state convention and support of and commitment to PA Lions clubs in general. We look forward to renewing our relationships for future state conventions and meetings.

"Lions' Work in Trying Times"



I have been contemplating this article for the last few weeks as I watch the world around us change. I have started, deleted, started again, edited and made continuous changes to my Spring message. Precautions surrounding COVID-19 have seized control of the world and confusion surrounds us all. Lions meetings, fundraisers, projects and conventions have all been canceled for

the foreseeable future, giving us pause.

What can we do as Lions in these trying times? Lions generally have limited resources available to use, mostly time and money. Usually during times of crisis or need Lions jump in with a guick fundraiser and make a contribution of money or supplies to address an immediate need. Unfortunately, with social distancing, a fundraiser cannot be held, our usual ability to raise money is extremely limited. What do we do? Check on your neighbors, especially the elderly and handicapped, see if they have sufficient supplies, offer to do their shopping for them. Check with local food banks, Meals on Wheels, churches, and school districts, do they need drivers to deliver meals and food supplies. With roadside rests mostly shut down, check with PENNDOT to see if you can set up a free coffee distribution to the truck drivers delivering supplies to keep our stores filled. Lastly, does your Club have a pot of money that can be donated to local food banks.

Any help you provide during these trying times, please be sure the service is input to MyLion or MyLCI by your club secretary or club global service coordinator. Reporting your service is critical to Lions Clubs International in getting matching funds from other foundations that support what we do.

It's spring 2020; we are three-quarters of the way through Lions Year 2019-2020 and it's a great time to be a Lion. Unfortunately, with the COVID-19 crisis, our clubs' spring and summer projects' planning has come to a standstill. Analyze those projects, can they be rescheduled for late summer and fall? Start the conversation through teleconference; engage your club in these projects, start the planning. Your community needs you.

I challenge every Lion and every Lions Club to continue their support of Lions Clubs International Foundation. In 50 years, the Foundation has donated over \$1 billion which could not be done without the donations of all Lions. LCIF has undertaken a major Capital Campaign to raise \$300 million over three years to further their support of Lions projects and humanitarian needs around the world.

During campaign Sight First I and II, Pennsylvania Lions stepped up and were very generous. Unfortunately, last year our donations were off by 25%. I know there were many new requests for funds; Pennsylvania Lions stepped up and donated over \$60,000 to support children with cancer through the Four Diamonds Foundation, and I thank District 14-T for all their hard work with that challenge which continues this year. We also asked you to participate in a new program, the Brady Buggies. That challenge was the most successful of all, over 125 buggies were donated to hospitals across Pennsylvania. These two new projects are primarily responsible for the reduced donations to your Lions Clubs International Foundation. With Brady Buggies no longer a project, I'm asking each club to increase their donations to LCIF. An additional \$20 per member, above what your club's normal donation is, will bring in over \$360,000 to LCIF. Please consider making a donation to LCIF. Lions have proven we have the ability to change the world.

Pennsylvania Lions have three well-known research foundations that historically have supported researchers with small seed grants that help them prove their theories that have gone on to multi-million federal grants that led to huge leaps in what we know about sight and hearing loss. The PA Lions Hearing Research Foundation, the PA Lions Sight Conservation and Eye Research Foundation and the Western PA Lions Hearing Foundation have all assisted researchers to make that next discovery. All are asking for your support to continue the good fight.

PA Lions Beacon Lodge, known as one of the best Lions Camps in the country, is one of the original Lions Camps for the Blind. After losing their annual money from the state of Pennsylvania, they have struggled to keep up with the cost of running the camp. I'm asking every club to participate in the Beacon Lodge 500 club; just \$5 per member; that's over \$92,000 if every Lion in Pennsylvania participates. Don't forget their annual golf tournament; of the more than 750 clubs in Pennsylvania, less than 10% sponsored a \$100 hole, a potential for another \$60,000 to the Camp. Don't forget about the Carl Shoemaker Fellowship, honor a member of your club.

Are you donating to the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation? Are you recommending your members for Foundation Fellowships or PIP Wroblewski awards? Honor a member of your club with these awards. Is your club asking for grants from the Foundation; nearly \$100,000 in grants is given away each year.

Finally, membership, that terrible word that we tip toe around. Only five of the 17 Districts have a membership growth currently. Please continue to work membership with your District Governor, District GMT, club membership chairpersons, club presidents and all Lions. Lions do a lot of amazing things in our communities and those communities have learned to depend upon us. What is going to happen to our communities in five, 10 or 20 years if we don't replace ourselves, grow and flourish? Who is going to provide meals, host the Easter Egg hunt, the Halloween parade, build a handicap ramp and the many other projects we do in our communities? Now is not the time to take our foot off the membership pedal, keep moving forward and continue to seek out new members.

Don't invite them to a meeting but to a service project, the club needs to embrace that visitor, talk to them about your club, its services and the good you do for the community. Then invite them to a meeting and offer membership. My continued challenge, each club ends the 2019-2020 Lions year with a plus two.

WE SERVE. It's our motto and what Lions are all about. Please continue to do great things for your communities. Find that new project that will benefit your community.

Please note: The method by which the Council of Governors will meet was changed in the wake of the cancellation of the 2020 MD-14 state convention in Erie.

All committee chairpersons and/or coordinators who have an Action Item for State Council to consider at this meeting <u>must</u> submit that item in written form to the State Office no later than April 27, 2020. Any Action Item received after that date may, at the discretion of the Council of Governors, be tabled until the first 2020-2021 State Council meeting in August. Committee chairpersons/coordinators with Action Items must be present or have a representative on the teleconference. All oral committee reports to State Council should be limited to 3-5 minutes.

Committee chairpersons and/or coordinators who do not have Action Items for State Council to consider are also encouraged to submit their written reports to the State Office by April 27.

State committee appointments

The following MD-14 state committee appointments will be included in the 2019-2020 Council Meeting #4 agenda. Lions interested in serving in those capacities should review the current MD-14 Constitution and By Laws/Policy Manual posted in the "About Us" section on www.palions.org for required qualifications and then contact their District Governor to be nominated for appointment by the Council of Governors:

- Building Maintenance and Property Committee (*Policy 110*) -- One-year term. Incumbents are eligible for re-appointment. Incumbents: PDG Wayne Bickel (14-A), PDG Ron Kodgis (14-J) and Lion Doug Nace (14-C).
 - Protocol Chairperson (Policy 112) -- One-year appointment. Currently vacant.
- Constitution and By-Laws/Policy Committee Chairperson and members (*Policy 200*) -- One-year appointment. Incumbents are eligible for re-appointment. Incumbents: PCC Terri Kodgis (14-J), chair; PDG Dennis Cope (14-C), Central Region representative; PDG Lance Remic (14-E), Western Region representative; PDG Phil Shober (14-P), Eastern Region representative. PCC Kodgis and PDGs Cope and Remic have expressed an interest in being re-appointed. PDG Shober has indicated he does not wish to be re-appointed.
 - International Convention Committee (*Policy 206*) Two-year appointment from District 14-T/Central Region.
 - **PRIDE Editor** (*Policy 212*) -- One-year appointment. <u>Incumbent</u>: Lion Betty Lou Ivell (14-N). Lion Ivell has expressed an interest in being re-appointed.
- Leader Dogs Coordinator (*Policy 304*) -- 3 year term. Incumbent is eligible for re-appointment. Incumbent: Lion Amanda Remic (14-E). Lion Remic has expressed an interest in being re-appointed.
- Diabetes Program Coordinator (*Policy 307*) -- Three-year appointment. <u>Incumbent</u>: PDG Dr. Don Gibala (14-N) has indicated he does not wish to be considered for re-appointment.
 - Youth Exchange Coordinator (*Policy 309*) -- Three-year appointment. Currently vacant.
 - Website/Information Technology Coordinator (*Policies 308 and 308 A*) One-year appointment. Incumbent: PDG John Mallonee (14-T). PDG Mallonee has expressed an interest in being reappointed.
 - **KidSight USA Coordinator** (*Policy 314*) Three-year appointment. Newly created position.
 - Committee on Committees ad hoc committee Central Region representative.
 - 2022-2023 State Council Meeting #2 Chair (Policy 202) Appointment to be made by District 14-N.
 - **2022-2023 State Council Meeting #3 Chair (***Policy 202***)** District 14-D Governor William Grager has nominated PDG Deb Burkholder.



"One Lion's Service Journey"

Many years ago, I found a website called "AnySoldier. com" and as we all do, I began to surf the site. I found thou sands of soldiers from each branch of the military representing their units and requesting donations to make their deployments more bearable. Most of the requests were basic items like snack foods and personal hygiene items. There was also a brief profile on where the unit was deployed, what branch of service they were in and how many soldiers needed support.

I spent hours reading the profiles and trying to decide which soldier I wanted to begin supporting based on the information they provided. Finally, I chose one soldier and started purchasing items for my first package. It was definitely a journey. Once my box was ready to mail, I had to learn how to send mail to the military address given and be sure everything was filled out properly and sealed tightly. The website even told me how to wrap the package to ensure that my package got to its intended destination. As recommended, I included a brief letter telling a little bit about who I was and an email address where I could be contacted if the soldier wanted to do so. I also made it very clear that it was only if they wanted to and that the package came with no strings attached. Of course, I always hoped for some response to know that I had been successful.

I was not disappointed. The first soldier I supported always made sure I knew they received the package and how much it meant to them to have my support. As we became better acquainted, I always asked if there was anything special they would like and if possible I would send it their way. My packages started going out on a weekly basis and I sent everything from snacks, personal hygiene items, blankets, Christmas lights, DVDs, magazines and even fishing lures. Whatever they asked for I tried to deliver. It was a small price for me to pay to say, "thank you for your service."

Each soldier I supported was for approximately 9-12 months and each time I chose a new soldier to support the experience was meaningful and very rewarding. By the time I got to my fourth soldier I had the process down to a science and it was working like a finely tuned machine.

My fourth soldier's name was Rodney and I supported him while he was deployed to Afghanistan. He was in the Army and he was a sergeant. The relationship started as it did with all the other soldiers I had supported, but over time we developed a special bond. We spent many hours online emailing back and forth as he sometimes just wanted someone to talk to and

we talked about anything and everything. He had a wife and three children back home and I also got to know them very well through him. When Rodney's deployment ended it was hard to say goodbye as it always was but this time it was even harder because of the bond we had developed.

Once he was home, we did continue to stay in touch. About a year later after serving 14 years in the military and many deployments Rodney decided to retire from the military. He was originally from North Carolina and moved back there after his discharge. It was always my hope to one day get to meet him face to face and less than a year after he returned to North Carolina I got my wish and we met at the home of his parents. That was over 10 years ago and we are still very good friends to this day. We consider each other family and visit with each other at least once a year.

Service is decidedly a journey; sometimes the journey is short but sometimes the journey lasts a lifetime. The rewards of service are invaluable to me and I truly love giving to others. I hope your journeys in service are filled with many special moments similar to what I have experienced. The feeling is irreplaceable. Find someone or something to share your time and talents with and know that you have made a difference. One person at a time is all that it takes to make special things happen.

"New Members WANT to Belong"

No matter the stage of life, most people desire to be needed, wanted and have a sense of being appreciated. There is also the feeling of purpose. As Lions recruiting new members or forming new clubs, we need to provide a reason for joining the largest volunteer organization in the world!

With the newly required position of Marketing Communications Chairperson, Lions International has numerous resources for your club to lead this role in your community. Think of your club as a business and market your club's successes. What will this do for our organization?

- Increases club's visibility
- Establishes relationships with local media, officials and community influencers
- Promotes club events, service activities and other newsworthy stories
- Increases the impact of club's projects and membership initiatives

District 14-G invested monies into a display through billboards along the busiest sections of the district to invite the public to serve their communities by using the slogan, "We Serve!" Exposing the 'best kept secret,' during the holiday seasons apparently sparked an awareness of our great organization. However, there is no way to track the connections, but there must be some correlation to this awareness. The boards were displayed towards the end of October and were removed March 8, 2020. The lowest point of membership was 1598 in December; currently the district is at 1655 while adding members unexpectedly in clubs that have not been recruiting! The district increased the visibility beyond the club level.

With the awareness of publicity in Lionism, the community influencers and officials are taking an interest in 'giving back.' Promoting club events by inviting local and county officials to be engaged in the event will demonstrate a community working together for a common goal and the feeling of purpose or belonging.

At these events, display what your club does with pictures. As they say, "a picture tells a thousand words." When questions start being asked about the display, don't go to the length of details – do provide a hand-out with the five areas upon which Lions focus: Childhood Cancer, Diabetes, Environment, Hunger and Vision. Youth is always an added plus. This is a marketing tool; find a company that will print it in a nice format, so it looks professional. While in conversation, invite them to an activity in which

they can help in some capacity that is worthy of appraisal. Instead of using the word volunteer, incorporate words in relation with no feeling of pressure, such as: "chip in;" "pitch in;" "assist" or "help."



As a marketing tool, follow through with a thank you note or a personal phone call thanking them for being an asset to the activity. They may just inquire about attending a meeting or invite them to a free meal to hear more about the club and the enjoyment of helping others.

When successful with the invite and a potential member, a welcome letter should hit on the topics that are most important to Lions Clubs. Encourage the new member to remain active for one year – as parents, we usually encourage our children to stay with the program to its entirety or for a full season, then the new member will decide if the organization fits their needs.

Within a short time frame, provide a complete list of contacts of your club members' email addresses, phone numbers and texting availability in case the new member has questions at any time. Before leaving the first club meeting provide the new member with a calendar of events and a newsletter from your club or district. In addition to making the new member feel welcomed as a part of the club include a second "membership-type card" to encourage them to invite a friend and they will receive a bonus, such as \$10 off their dues.

After witnessing the energy in new members within my own district, Lions Clubs will be rejuvenated with their additional ideas, witnessing creative juices encouraging new endeavors with a new perspective, while enhancing our missions for the betterment of our communities, state, country and the world! Provide that feeling of belonging, and watch the organization grow!

"Challenge to Retain Members"

Dear Lions, Lioness and Leos,

Are you aware that each year we lose more members than we add? Too frequently we hear that no one, especially the younger generation, wants to volunteer. Well, that's not the case. Many individuals of all ages are interested in "giving back" to their communities. However, these are a few suggestions they would like for us to consider:



PDG Evan Punchard and I always enjoy receiving donations for Lions Clubs International Foundation to support Lions clubs around the world and the marvelous work they perform. Several areas are currently experiencing weather-related disasters. These are not

uncommon but when they happen people can lose their homes, their jobs and sometimes family and friends. LCIF has been assisting Lions clubs with disaster relief since its inception in 1968. The very first grant was awarded to assist victims of flooding in the United States.

Recently I visited a Lions club to give a presentation on LCIF/Campaign 100. At the conclusion of the meeting the club made a very generous three-year pledge to "Campaign 100." One of the members approached me and asked if an individual who is not a Lion may make a donation to LCIF and have it earmarked solely for a country that has experienced a disaster recently. I said, "Absolutely." The very next morning he called me and asked if I would be willing to visit his mother who was born in Puerto Rico which has been experiencing earthquakes. Later that day I made the drive to her home and met with Angelita. She is a wonderful woman and we conversed for quite a while about some of the people that we both knew. Her brother-in-law had been a long-time Lion, therefore she did have some knowledge of Lions clubs.

The reason Angelita called me to her home was because her son told her that at his Lions club meeting the previous evening, he heard about Lions Clubs International Foundation and the work we are performing in Australia and Puerto

Rico. She wanted to know the details of LCIF and what support we are providing Lions clubs in Puerto Rico which are recovering from recent earthquakes. She questioned me that if she makes a donation to LCIF earmarked for Puerto Rico, how much of her donation would go toward helping the victims in Puerto Rico? We all know the answer, it's 100%.

Through her tears, she reminisced of growingup in Puerto Rico with her large family. Small earthquakes would occasionally strike in the area, causing perhaps minor damage to their home. Afterwards her family did not feel safe, so they all slept outdoors due to fear of aftershocks, or that even more destructive earthquakes would strike during the middle of the night while they were asleep, fearing their home would collapse on top of them.

Angelita has family members still living in Puerto Rico. Many she has not seen for decades, but she felt that one thing she could do to help them, was to make a sizable donation to the Lions Club International Foundation specifically earmarked for the victims of the Puerto Rico earthquakes.


