

Leadership profile

Council Chair has ingredients for success

Currently the highest ranking Lion in Multiple District 14, Catherine G. "Cathy" Baker joined the world's largest civic-service organization in a most unusual manner.

Baker became a Lion when she had the winning ticket in a January 2010 Charity Cancer Auction. Her prize: An associate membership in the Waynesboro Lions Club (District 14-T) with state and International dues paid for one year.

Six months later, she became a full-fledged, active member of the club and began her ascent through the ranks of Lionism.

The climb has seen Baker serve as her club's Tail Twister – "I had such a fun time getting the Lions to laugh and keeping the meetings light-hearted," she said – club president (2016-2017), zone chairperson and district Global Membership Team Coordinator (2017-2018).

In 2018, she won election as Second Vice District Governor and started a three-year term as a member of the 14-T District Governor leadership team. She served as District Governor a year ago before, in accordance with MD-14's rotation system, assuming her current position as chairperson of the 18-person Pennsylvania State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors.

Baker admits she "did not know much about Lions" when she won her membership in 2010; she credits a plethora of mentors and role models for aiding her in the ascent.

First and foremost on that list is Denise Heck, Baker's sponsoring Lion and a self-described "decades-old friend."

"I have known Cathy since the 1980s," said Heck, who during many early conversations with Baker realized they had

often walked the very same paths while their families lived in the Monterey/Seaside area of California. "We agreed it was a very small world," Heck said.

Heck and Baker were neighbors while stationed at Fort Ritchie "and we have had an on-going friendship since that time," Heck said. "We have helped each other during good times, bad times, trials and tribulations. She has been a steadying force in my life and I'd like to think I have helped her through some disappointments during her life as well."

Heck's big-sister-like pride in Baker's accomplishments shows through when she points out Baker was the first person in her family to graduate from college, a Bachelor's degree from Geneva College firmly held in her hand. "She has now instilled the values of continued learning to her grandsons," Heck said.

The daughter of Master Sergeant
Massimo Torri, a U.S. Army police officer,
and his wife, Margaret Klingenberg-Torri, the
current Council Chair was born on an Army
installation in California. As was the routine at
the time for military families, she, her parents
and six siblings moved every two years as her
father was re-assigned.

"Mom always said I have a bit of the gypsy in my soul," Baker said, "so I adapted to change at a young age. It was important to choose your friends wisely because you never knew when their family or yours would be moving again."

Included in the moves made by her family was her first airplane ride, at the age of four, when the family shifted its base to Japan. "It was an amazing place to live," Baker said.

Looking back on her life, Baker said it was while the family lived in Japan that she got her introduction to service, watching her mom help other military wives and their families.

The family later lived in Germany and several American states as well, but Fort Ord, California, always seemed to be home base. The last military installation on which the family lived was Fort Hood, Texas. "I loved Texas," Baker said, "and picked up a bit of Southern accent there."

While at Fort Hood, she developed her passion to be ... what else, a baker. "I became a Girl Scout and started my life in community service there," she said. "The Lone Star Gas company gave us cooking lessons and Army Community Service (ACS) had community days, so Mom let me bake cakes for the cake walk."

Baker's cake-making abilities were so good ACS wound up asking her to make cakes for every event. "I still have that cookbook folder and love baking," Baker said.

That love for being in the kitchen came in handy when Baker decided to pursue Lions leadership positions; she used her favorite chocolate chip cookie recipe as a campaign tool when she ran for District 14-T Second Vice District Governor in 2018.

It was a true campaign and election; Baker had to defeat a Past District Governor seeking a second go-round as Governor.

Baker feels honored to be the fifth female to serve as MD-14 Council Chair. "Many wonderful lady Lions have set the path for me," she said.

And men, like the late Dr, Terry Musselman, who served as Council Chair during the 2004-2005 Lions year."



"I would not be Council Chair without the conversations I had with PCC Terry," Baker said. "He saw a spark in me I didn't see at the time, planted the leadership seed in me, believed in me and encouraged me to consider moving forward.

"He was such a valued Lion in our Multiple District; I feel very humbled to follow in his footsteps," Baker said.

As Chair of this year's Council of Governors, Baker has a unique blend of ingredients with which to work. After being one of only two female District Governors on the 2020-2021 Council of Governors chaired by Marilyn Wagner that included two Lions serving a second term as District Governor, Baker leads a 2021-2022 Council that includes six female Governors and an all-time-high six second-term Governors.

As the result of a resolution passed last summer by the LCI board of directors, the current Council of Governors could be the last one on which a Past District Governor will serve a second term. That is a positive

step in the growth of our organization, according to Baker. "While we need to grow membership, we also need to be proactive in growing our leadership," she said. "Just because they are PDGs does not mean they have all the answers. If you lead with your heart and your head, you will be fine."

Baker's first exposure to, in her words, "the vast training topics for Lions," came while she was attending the 2015 USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Grand Rapids, Mich.

"I felt so empowered after that Forum," she said. "I needed more information on what being a District Governor required and I was hooked as a lifelong learner."

Baker has the credentials to prove it. A Progressive Lions Clubs International Foundation Melvin Jones Fellow, she is a graduate of LCI's Emerging (2016) and Advanced (2017) Leadership institutes and proud recipient of Bachelor's (2016) and Master's (2017) degrees from Lions University held in conjunction with the Forum.

Baker made her decision to begin the run for District Governor after travelling to the Forum in Grand Rapids with Kathy Fouse and Salli Miller Stentzel, two of 10 lady Lions who preceded her as District 14-T Governor.

"PDGs Kathy and Salli are two of my mentors," Baker said. "Some of the others who have answered my many questions have been and continue to be Past International Directors Cindy Gregg and Jim Cavallaro and (14-T) Past District Governors Sam Wagner, Pete Van Zandt and Lee Eisenhard.

"PDG Lee and I discussed what was involved in moving up in the different leadership positions and what was expected of me, and he gave me an idea of the out-of-pocket costs I would have. That was an eye opener for me.

Eisenhard, who served as 14-T's Governor during the 2013-2014 Lions year, said he was just repaying a past debt.

"Lion Cathy supported me as I was making my journey to becoming a District Governor, so as a PDG and member of the same Lions club as she is, I returned the favor by supporting her," Eisenhard said. "From the beginning, she has been very active in the club and supportive of District functions. The club is very proud to have Lion Cathy as an active member and as Council Chair."

Baker was the fourth Waynesboro Lion and first female to serve as District Governor and is the first club member to serve as Council Chair.

The sponsor of seven new members during her 11 years as a Lion, Baker is an avid supporter of PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp, Leader Dogs for the Blind and Lions Clubs International Foundation and proponent of the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum and Lions Clubs International Convention.

"They both provide value to our membership," she said. "I personally believe we go to conventions to meet other Lions and to the Forum to educate ourselves."

Baker was "awestruck by everything going on" at the 100th LCI Convention in Chicago that included entertainment by the Beach Boys and Chicago as well as the late Charlie Daniels. "And. if you can travel to the convention via tour bus, your convention experience will be filled with fabulous memories," she said.

Asked on several occasions if she had an interest in pursuing higher Lions Clubs International offices after her term as Council Chair concludes, Baker responds, "I feel very honored to have been asked, and at one time I was considering it, but things have changed in my life. I no longer have that aspiration."

She is content with being Council Chair, daughter, sister, mother of one daughter and one son, grandmother of six boys and greatgrandmother of one boy.

Council of Governors Meeting #1: Action review

The 2021-2022 PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors took the following action during its first meeting August 7, 2021, at the Red Lion Hotel Harrisburg Hershey:

- Approved the PA Lions All State Band's 2021-2022 budget;
- Approved the Constitution & By Laws/ Policy (C&BL/P) Committee's recommendation to revise Policy 206-International Convention Committee to allow Committee members attending the International Convention reimbursement of 5 days/5 nights lodging, travel, per diem and early registration fees from the International Convention Fund;
- Approved C&BL/P recommendation to revise Policy 210-USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Committee and reduce the committee to 3 members serving a 3 year term selected by region on a rotating basis;
- Approved revision of Policy 210-USA/ Canada Lions Leadership Forum Committee, General 6. Reimbursement to read "Whenever possible expenses shall be reduced by utilizing email, teleconferences or virtual means";
- Approved revision of Policy 210-USA/
 Canada Lions Leadership Forum Committee,
 General 6b to read "Chairperson and Vice
 Chairperson will be eligible for reimbursement for travel, lodging, per diem and early bird registration to attend the Forum";
- Approved to delete Policy 303 and Policy 303A-Lioness Coordinator and Application for MD-14 Lioness of the Year Award entirely in light of the discontinuation of that program by Lions Clubs International (LCI) as of June 30, 2021;
- Approved the current version of the State Convention Policies and Manual document and review that document prior to the start of the 2022 convention;
- Approved C&BL/P's request for the creation of a Centennial Celebration ad hoc committee on a year-long celebration in 2023 of PA Lions' 100th year of service;
- Approved Global Membership Team Coordinator PDG Cheryl Wilbur's request to submit a \$15,000 public relations grant request to LCI for the purpose of renting billboards designed to increase membership;
- Approved PDG Wilbur's request to seek a \$750 grant each from the Lions of PA Foundation (LOPF) and Northeast PA Lions Service Foundation (NEPALSF) to provide the needed funds for the 10% matching funds required by LCI in order to receive the PR grant;



- Approved PDG Wilbur's request to expend up to \$1,500 in MD-14 funds. if needed, to serve as as the 10% matching funds for the LCI PR grant;
- Approved PDG Wilbur's request to seek an additional \$5,000 grant each from LOPF and NEPALSF to assist with the purchase of the billboards;
- Authorized the State Office Task Force to complete work on an Employee Handbook to be ready for approval by Council at the second 2021-2022 State Council meeting, at which point the Task Force would be dissolved;
- Approved the PA International Family's request to endorse PID A.P. Singh of India for the office of International Third Vice President to be elected at the 2022 LCI Convention in Montreal, Canada:
- Forwarded to the Finance and C&BL/P committees a request to review the current General Reimbursement policy as it pertains to mileage, lodging and per diem for the Council of Governors and state committee members.



From Global Membership Approach Champion, Area D-I PJD Cindy Gregg

Dear MD-14 Lions and Leos,

Welcome back! Many clubs are now meeting and making plans to serve our communities. By now, I'm sure that you are aware that our International President Doug Alexander's theme is "Service from the Heart." So, it is time to "put our hearts into action" by providing meaningful and compassionate service, to better communicate with our members, to listen to their suggestions and concerns and to share our success stories.



In order to provide compassionate and meaningful service projects, I would like to recommend that your clubs and district prepare a calendar to plan unique service activities and list important events for the year.

Since most school districts are planning to hold in-person education, one project that I would like to share comes from MD-17 (Kansas). They are supplying **Diabetic Emergency Kits** for classrooms that include

- Detailed instructions on how to test and treat low blood sugar
- Description of various symptoms
- Instructions to call for extra help
- Juice boxes
- Glucose tablets
- Snacks, like granola/protein bars or crackers
- Extra vial of test strips and batteries for meters and pumps, as needed
- Bottled water
- Cooling pack

In addition, **September is Childhood Cancer Month**. Are you aware that about 43 children are diagnosed with cancer each day, while some 300,000 children under the age of 19, are diagnosed with this horrible disease each year? Even for survivors, 2/3 will face latent side effects. Furthermore, only 4% of the billions of dollars that are spent annually on cancer research goes towards treating childhood cancers.

Therefore, I would like to encourage your clubs to join the Lions of Pennsylvania and Four Diamonds to "Play like a Kid" and raise funds to help conquer this dreaded illness. Read more about the "Play for the Kids" Project at http://fourdiamonds.org/playforthekids.

Also, consider thanking a group of hard-working individuals who rarely get acknowledged. **National Custodian Day is October 2**. Think about sending thank you notes to the custodial staff for all of their efforts to keep the schools clean and safe, especially during the past year. If your budget allows, prepare some treats to share with them, or provide a sandwich ring and dessert for their lunch. I'm sure that it would be greatly appreciated.

THIS LIST NEEDS TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE LIONS STATE OFFICE BY NOVEMBER 1.

Through my monthly messages, I have been stressing the importance of reporting District Chairs, Leo Club Advisors and Leo Members. The following figures are as of September 15, 2021:

DISTRICT CHAIRS – Of our 16 Districts with Leo Clubs, there are six Districts that DO NOT have their District Leo Chairs reported to LCI.

ADVISORS – Of our 114 Leo Clubs, there are 76 Leo Clubs without an Advisor reported to LCI. Please remember the Advisor must be a Lion to be reported to LCI. If your Leo Advisors are faculty members and NOT Lions, please list a Lion who will work closely with the Leo Club. OR better yet, invite your Advisors to become Lions!

LEO MEMBERSHIP – Again, of the 114 Leo Clubs, most LCI Membership Rosters have not been updated for the 2021-2022 Lions Year. I'm sure as the Leo Clubs start meeting, the updates will begin.

PLEASE NOTE – I have been contacted by several Leo Advisors (Lions) trying to report their membership. They are being denied access. Please remember, unless they are reported as an Advisor for 2021-2022, their previous term as Advisor expired June 30, 2021.

The **LEO OF THE YEAR** is a prestigious award presented to **Leos** who have demonstrated outstanding leadership and positively impacted their **Leo** clubs and community. Each Multiple District may nominate one Leo annually.

Of our 114 Leo Clubs, each of these Clubs has at least one outstanding member who can be nominated as a Club LEO OF THE YEAR. Using the official nomination form – LEOLOY-EN – please submit your Club's nomination to your District Governor.

District Governors must submit their District's nomination to me no later than January 7, 2022. I will forward – hopefully 16 nominations – to our Council of Governors for the selection of our MD-14 nomination – which must be received at LCI by March 1, 2022.

Our **2020-2021 MD-14 Leo of the Year** will be recognized at the February 2022 Council Meeting's Saturday Night dinner, at the Wyndham Garden York.

2022 LEO RALLY – The dates provided by Beacon Lodge Camp for our 2022 Leo Rally are April 22-23-24. After COVID caused our Rally to be cancelled the past two years, I am looking forward to a successful Rally in 2022. I will be forwarding information to our Districts and Leo Clubs as it becomes available.

2022 STATE CONVENTION – The 2022 State Convention will be held May 20-21-22, 2022 at the Valley Forge Casino Resort in King of Prussia. I would like to work closely with the Convention Committee, hoping to have several Leo activities planned. Again, I will share more details as the information becomes available.

MD-14 LCIF REPORT

At the August 7th State Council Meeting ID Larry Edwards and PID Jim Cavallaro shaved their mustaches as over \$11,350 was raised for Campaign 100. Twelve names were drawn from Lions who bought \$25 tickets. Congratulations to the winners who were: **PID Bob Miller** (14-U), **Ambridge Lions Club** (14-N), **Springfield Lions Club** (14-A), **Lion Doug Long** who won twice (14-T), **PDG Estella Kristiniak** (14-A), **Lion Pete Schempf** (14-B), **PDG Jim Crawley** (14-G), **Zelienople Lions Club** (14-N), **Lion Edward Fitch** (14-P), **PIP Clem Kusiak** (Maryland) and **PDG Charlie McGrew** (14-E). Thank you to everyone who contributed to this great cause!

MD-14 raised \$77,500 less last Lion's year than the previous year; only two Districts were on the plus side from the previous year. They were 14-P (\$1,477.09) and 14-W (\$2,413). District 14-C was the only District with 100% club participation and they are at 83% towards their goal. Last year only 48.48% of the clubs in MD-14 donated to LCIF. District 14-P is the only other District over 50% and they are at 52% towards their goal. There is a lot of work to do in this final year of the campaign.

Giving Melvin Jones Fellowships is a great way of honoring a deserving Lion in your club! Also using your Campaign 100 coin boxes is a good way of raising funds for LCIF.

Originally Model Clubs were to meet their commitment by June 2023. There is a very good chance that it will change to three years from when they fill out the paperwork, which will give them extra time.

Childhood Cancer so far has received grants for \$851,935 and COVID-19 grants for \$6,181,689.

We will need the help from every club in MD-14 to achieve our goals! Please put Campaign 100 front and center this year. The need is as great as ever with more natural disasters happening throughout the world.

MD-14 has an opportunity to make a major impact serving those in need through our donations to Campaign 100. People are counting on us!

A Strasburg, PA family (**District 14-D**), sustained a devastating house fire on July 5, 2021, following a family picnic. Nearly half the house was ruined by fire, smoke, and water. Fortunately, there were no injuries. Running into one of the sons at a restaurant, **PDG Bill Grager** inquired as to the family's well-being and if there was anything we as Lions could do to help.

Learning that the family was organizing work parties to help gut a vast portion of the house so that available insurance monies could be used for reconstruction, PDG Bill reached out to **Lion Jim Groff** (Disaster Relief Coordinator) as a consultant in working with such events. Lions Bill and Jim met the family at the site to learn what needed to be done.

Lion Bill contacted the **Willow Street** and **Strasburg Lions Clubs** to solicit volunteers to join the community and friends' work parties on July 31 and August 7. During the course of the two days, ten Lions were involved in this service, representing the **Willow Street**, **Strasburg**, and **Christiana Lions Clubs**: **District Governor Richard Sware**, **Past District Governor Bill Grager**, **Lions Jeanie Sware**, **Dave Miller**, **Karen Buckwalter**, **Jim Rice**, **Pete Coste**, **Jim Duprey**, **Jim Groff** and **Ed Baylor**. Volunteer **Josh Shrom** from Gap, PA also served as a representative of Christiana.

The Strasburg Lions Club is also soliciting monetary donations for the family to help offset some of the expenses of their loss. This is yet another example of Lions personifying the Lions Motto, *We Serve*, and International President Douglas Alexander's theme: *Service from the Heart*, and District Governor Dick's theme: *Making A Difference 1 At A Time*.

At the request of **Heather Stem**, family spokesperson, the Lions of **Brogue Community** and **East Prospect (14-C)** have purposely not published anything about the accident/fundraiser for the **Cohenour family** for several months. In December 2020 the family was involved in a tragic head-on crash that totally destroyed their vehicle, put everyone in the hospital with **Amanda** the mother being flown to the trauma crisis center in Christiana, DE and costing the life of their almost two-year-old son, **Johnny**.

In January 2021, the Lions partnered to raise funds through cash donations and a meat raffle. As **2VDG**, **Keith Shoff** had the opportunity to present this tragic story and the fundraiser to the entire MD-14 training class in February.

In May, Heather was contacted about presenting the funds to the family; she asked the Lions to hold off for a few weeks as the family was settling back into their own home in southern York County and they'd be more comfortable meeting the Lions after they'd had more time to adjust.

On June 29, **Howard Clever** of the East Prospect Club and Pat **Hoens** of the Brogue Community Club met with the Cohenour family and presented a check for \$29,312.00 to the family. It became a very emotional evening as the family was deeply touched by the outpouring of love from so many people they would probably never meet.

The family is still struggling with the loss of their son, Johnny and the ongoing physical trauma. Amanda will require more surgeries but the hospital is waiting to see how well her bone graft heals. Randy has returned to work and the three daughters are doing well physically.

This gift would not have been possible without YOU, the Lions of MD-14. Thank you all.

From Paws to Refresh (worthy of repeat....) by State Administrator Lion Bob McComas

Liquor not permitted in basket raffles

Please be aware: A popular staple in basket raffles is a "no-no."



After researching the matter with the Executive Director of the PA House of Representatives' Liquor Committee and the PA Liquor Control Board, MD-14 legal counsel Lion Ashley Grimm reported that "liquor is not permitted to be in a basket for purposes of a raffle. This also

includes silent auctions.

"This equates to selling liquor without a license," Lion Grimm said. "A wine and spirits gift card is permitted to be included in a raffle basket, though." Lion Grimm's research supported the opinion expressed by Lawrence County Treasurer Richard Rapone in a recent New Castle News story that had prompted MD-14 State Council Chair Bill Morgan to contact Lion Grimm.

As part of the News story, Capt. Jamie Jones of the LCB Enforcement Bureau said including any type of alcoholic beverage – be it a six pack of beer, a bottle of wine, a bottle of whiskey or the like – is a violation of the Pennsylvania Liquor Code, Title 47, and is an unclassified misdemeanor offense. The fine upon conviction is \$500, levied to the organization sponsoring the fundraiser and not the donor of the basket.

In the News story, Rapone pointed out, under the state's small games of chance law, it is illegal to host basket raffles at fundraising dinners used to benefit someone who is sick.



We have now done that and any club can let the major donor know that LOPF is registered with CyberGrants. We now have a universal email address: lionsofpafoundation@comcast.net . A few other companies connected with CyberGrants are Wawa, Target, Lowe's, McDonald's, Capital One, Verizon, etc.

CyberGrants FrontDoor is a portal that gives authorized nonprofit administrators the ability to access information from all of the corporate websites that CyberGrants hosts through a single address and set of credentials. It was born from a commitment to work closely with nonprofit organizations (LOPF) to make the philanthropic world a safe, efficient, and engaging place to "make incredible happen".


