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The PRIDE going paperless

Printed copies of The PRIDE of Pennsylvania, Multiple District 14's quarterly magazine, will soon become part of PA Lions history.

The 2018-2019 PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors, during their second meeting on February 2, 2018 voted to discontinue production of the printed and mailed PRIDE effective July 1, 2019.

Issues of The PRIDE produced after July 1, 2019, will only be produced in Portable Document Format (PDF). The publication will be posted on the state Lions website (<http://www.palions.org>), as it is now (in addition to being printed and mailed) and sent via email to members of the seated Council of Governors, Vice District Governors and sub-district newsletter editors and website coordinators. Those Lions will in turn be asked to forward the PDF document to Past District Governors and club secretaries for distribution to Lions, Lionesses and Leos.

The transition from a printed to an electronic PRIDE will free up approximately \$30,000 for the Multiple District to be, among other things, utilized in the development and maintenance of a new, more user-friendly state Lions website.

The Global Service Framework focuses the efforts of Lions and Leos on five service areas with the goal of tripling our humanitarian impact by serving 200 million people per year by 2021. The Global Service Framework complements all of the great ways clubs serve locally, and gives Lions and Leos new opportunities to help meet the growing challenges facing humanity.

No matter how you choose to serve, Lions matter now more than ever!



Rachel Pier receives Leo of Year honor

When Rachel Pier decides to do something, she doesn't just dip her toe in and test the water temperature. She dives right in.

The recipient of the 2017-2018 Multiple District 14 Leo of the Year award, Rachel joined the cub club sponsored by District 14-F's Waterford Lions Club in her freshman year at Fort LeBoeuf High School. A year later, she was the Leo club's secretary/



treasurer. The following year, she served as the club's vice president before completing the natural

ascension and serving as president during her senior year.

It will come as no surprise that her involvement did not end there. In her final year of high school, she coordinated a Leo club orientation session for incoming freshmen.

One of the Leo projects in which Rachel takes great pride was a Relay for Life fund raiser.

"She was at the event that moved indoors due to the weather, keeping the group on track much of the day," said her father, Lion Clifford Pier, one of the Fort LeBoeuf Leo advisors.

Angela Tarr, the high school's librarian and a member of the Summit (14-F) Lions Club, shares advisor duties with Lion Clifford.

"When it came time for the assembly to shave the heads of the boys who had agreed to be part of the event, Rachel organized the hairdressers and made sure the event ran smoothly," said Lion Clifford, an active member of the Waterford Lions Club since 2006.

When all the clipped hair was swept up and pledges collected, the Leos had collected \$1,400 for the American Cancer Society.

Rachel also became immersed in, among other projects, a personal products and holiday basket for the local food pantry, the Lions club's Santa in the Park project and the local Lioness club's Halloween party.

As you would expect, Rachel is humble about being named as the District 14-F and state Leo of the Year.

"I am very proud of being selected and truly enjoyed being involved in all the projects," she said.

Rachel had a good role model; her older brother, Brad, was the state Leo of the Year in 2014-2015.

Brad, a senior at Penn State's Behrend College in Erie, majoring in mechanical engineering, is currently a member of the Waterford club's board of directors.

While she was knee-deep in Leo club projects, Rachel – a freshman



at Penn State Behrend with an intended major of Project and Supply Chain Management – maintained good academic standing at Fort LeBoeuf. She was a proud member of the National Honor Society, Future Business Leaders of America and the Academic Sports League (ASL).

In recognition of being selected as Pennsylvania Lions' top cub, Rachel received a Multiple District Leos Founders Recognition Award, including a \$250 cash prize.

The state winner is selected each year by the PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors from a pool of candidates comprised of first-place finishers in sub-district competitions.

Leos considered for the prestigious award sponsored by Lions Clubs International must demonstrate outstanding leadership skills, achieve a superior record as a Leo in implementing successful service projects and make an identifiable contribution to the development and growth of the Leo Club Program.

Leo of the Year award winners are also expected to achieve distinction in community or school activities outside of Leo club commitments and demonstrate high ethical standards and personal integrity.

"Be My Eyes"

I'm asking all Lions to download the "Be My Eyes" app to their smartphone and be a volunteer. The premise is simple – to help someone who is visually impaired. Isn't that one of our main goals – to help the visually impaired? Here's how it works: As a blind or low vision person, whenever you need visual assistance, our volunteers are happy to help. Through the live video call, you and a volunteer can communicate directly and solve a problem. The volunteer will help guide which direction to point your camera, what to focus on or when to turn on your torch. As a sighted volunteer you can help just by installing the Be My Eyes app. A blind or a low vision user may need help with anything from checking expiration dates, distinguishing colors, reading instructions or navigating new surroundings. Be My Eyes' goal is to make the world more accessible to people who are blind or have a low level of vision. We couldn't do this without the help and dedication of our community. It's that simple! It only takes a few minutes of your time, and many volunteers are signed up, so don't worry if you can't take a call – it is automatically routed to the next volunteer, so whoever picks up first takes the call.

So you have questions about the app? Be My Eyes is a free mobile app with one main goal: to make the world more accessible for the blind and visually impaired. The app connects blind and visually impaired individuals with sighted volunteers and companies from all over the world through a live video call.

Since we launched in January 2015, more than 1,000,000 volunteers have signed up to assist blind and low vision users. Be My Eyes users can request assistance in over 180 languages making the app the biggest on-line community for blind and low vision people as well as one of the largest micro-volunteering platforms in the world! Every day, volunteers sign on to Be My Eyes to lend their sight to blind and low vision individuals to tackle challenges and solve problems together.

The Be My Eyes story started in Denmark in 2012 with Hans Jørgen Wiberg, a Danish furniture craftsman, who is visually impaired himself. Through his work at 'The Danish Association of the Blind', he recognized that blind or visually impaired people often needed a little assistance to solve everyday tasks. However, it wasn't until a blind friend told him that he used video calls to connect with family and friends, who could help him with these tasks, that Hans Jorgen got the idea for Be My Eyes. He believed that the technology of video calls could be used to visually assist blind or visually impaired individuals, without them having to rely on friends and family, but using a network of volunteers.

In April 2012, Hans presented his idea at a Danish startup event, where he got connected with a team that was ready to make Be My Eyes a reality. On January 15, 2015, the Be My Eyes app was released for iOS, and within 24 hours the app had more than 10,000 users. Since the release of the iOS app, an Android version has been in high demand. The Android version was finally released on October 5, 2017. In December 2017 Be My Eyes was chosen as Google Play Best Apps of 2017 in the categories; "Most Innovative", "Best Daily Helper" and "Best Hidden Gem", and in May 2018 Be My Eyes won the Google Play Award 2018 for "Best Accessibility Award".

So fellow Lions, take on my challenge – become a "Be My Eyes" volunteer. Check out www.bemyeyes.com and consider downloading the app to your smartphone. I signed up a few months ago and finally got my first call yesterday. It was a simple question: "What color are the pants I'm holding?", and the call probably took a total of 30 seconds of my day, but it made a difference for the caller.

Included in the graduation class in Columbus, Ohio, were Immediate Past District Governors James Foreso (Williamsburg Lions Club, District 14-L), Donald Kaufman (Emmaus, 14-K) and Cheryl Wilbur (Wells-Jackson, 14-G); First Vice District Governors William Keyburn (Warrington Township, 14-A), Linda Lupro (DuBois, 14-J) and Marilyn Wagner (Shillington, 14-P) and Second Vice Governor Thomas Vasek (Bensalem Township, 14-A).

IPDG Kaufman is also District 14-K's First Vice Governor.

Also receiving LU degrees this year were Past District Governors Bernadette Holzer (Tionesta, 14-F) and Kerry McKnight (New Freedom, 14-C); State Administrator Bob McComas (Lower Paxton Township, 14-T) and Lions Larry Frankenfield (Upper Perkiomen Valley, 14-A) and the husband-wife tandem of Jason and Trish Radmann (Williamsburg, 14-L).

PDGs Holzer and McKnight and IPDG Wilbur had each previously received their Bachelor's degrees at the 2015 Forum in Grand Rapids, Mich.; 1VDG Keyburn was awarded his Bachelor's degree in 2016 in Omaha, Neb. and 1VDG/IPDG Kaufman and Lion Frankenfield both earned their Bachelor's degrees at the 2017 Forum in Portland, Oregon.

The addition of this year's graduates increased to 24 the number of MD-14 Lions who have earned degrees since the LU program originated in 2014.

Pennsylvania Lions have earned a total of 24 bachelor's and 14 master's degrees from Lions University. No MD-14 Lion has been

awarded the ultimate LU honor, a Doctorate degree.

Lions University is year-round training provided by the Forum committee. Questions should be directed to LionsUniv@gmail.com.

There are three levels of classes for Lions University:

- The **Bachelor's Program** allows Lions to develop the skills necessary to lead a vital Lions Club.
- The **Master's Program** is aimed at District Level leaders ready to foster quality clubs in their District.
- The **Doctorate Program** focuses on skills needed to be a training facilitator for adult volunteers. Lions who complete the Doctorate Program are prepared to be great trainers of other Lions.

The deadline for completing coursework for a Lions University degree is August 31 of each year. Graduation ceremonies are held at each year's Forum.

To complete each program, Lions must complete 10 required courses, including at least five elective classes, and complete leadership experiences.

To complete a course, the Lion takes part in an hour-long training session offered online, as well as through periodic webinars and live sessions.

Once the training session is completed, the Lion takes a simple online test to confirm their learning. Upon completion, the Lion is awarded a certificate of course completion.

Welcome to 2019! The 2018 Holiday season is behind us and I sincerely hope everyone had a relaxing time with family and fellow Lions. I sincerely hope most clubs had a service project to support their communities by providing food to those in need, donating to local charities, or by a special way to provide service. Please ensure all your service projects are input to MyLion or MyLCI by your club secretary or global service coordinator. Reporting service is critical to Lions Clubs

International in getting matching funds from other foundations that support what we do.

In the last issue of The Pride, I challenged clubs to support Lions Clubs International's global service causes, now I want to challenge each club and district to support our Pennsylvania projects. We have some of the most respected foundations in Lionism; however, each of those projects is suffering from declining contributions by our shrinking membership.

Pennsylvania Lions Beacon Lodge Camp, founded in 1949, is one of the oldest and most well-known Lions camps. The Camp receives the majority of its funding from Pennsylvania Lions clubs. Recently they undertook a large telecommunications project to bring the Camp into the 21st century and better support their campers and operations. The entire camp has to be rewired and new wires must be run to the camp. Cost of the project is \$154,000. My challenge to the 686 Pennsylvania Lions clubs is to donate an additional \$250 above and beyond what you normally would donate and annotate it for the telecommunications project. That's \$171,000 that Beacon Lodge would have to complete the project with a 10 percent contingency. It is our camp with a great reputation, let's keep it that way. Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation is our foundation. District, club, and individual contributions go back into supporting projects within our own state. The Foundation provides nearly \$100,000 in grants to our clubs and districts. I challenge each club to donate \$500 and nominate one Lion to receive a Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation Fellowship. Or if you already have a Lion who is a Fellow, honor them again with a PIP Joseph Wroblewski Fellowship. Lastly, if your club has a large project and could use financial help, apply for a matching grant from the Foundation. For more information visit their website at <http://lionsofpafoundation.org>.

Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation was founded in 1979 by the Lions of Pennsylvania. Since its beginning, the foundation has provided millions of dollars in grants for hearing research. These grants are to Pennsylvania researchers and are used to validate their theories and enable them to apply for larger grants from the United States National Institutes of Health. I challenge each club to donate \$500 and nominate one Lion for a Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation John R. Crone Fellowship. Remember, only through RESEARCH can be the elimination of hearing impairment and deafness. For more information, visit their website at <http://plhrf.org/index.htm>.

Pennsylvania Lions Sight Conservation and Eye Research Foundation was founded in 1979 by the Lions of Pennsylvania. The Foundation's Mission is to raise funds for eye and diabetic research projects and equipment for clinical procedures. Eighty percent of blindness in the world is preventable and through research we will find a cure. Since its inception, the Foundation has provided millions of dollars in grants to Pennsylvania researchers, used to validate their theories and enable them to apply for larger grants from the United States National Institutes of Health. I challenge each club to donate \$500 and nominate one Lion for the Foundation's Memorial Endowment Fund. Finally, I can't leave you without a **membership challenge**. At the time of writing this article we have lost 797 members and nine clubs. By the end of December we will drop another nearly 100 members and five more clubs. We will be under 18,500 member, a far cry from when Pennsylvania had more than 30,000 Lions. Each Lion needs to bring one guest, not to a meeting but to a service project, the club needs to embrace that visitor, talk to them about your club, its services, the good you do for the community. Then invite them to a meeting and offer membership. My challenge, each club ends the 2018-2019 Lions year with a plus two, one being a woman to celebrate our organization's first woman president.

"Communication and Leadership"

Communication and leadership go hand in hand. A great leader also needs to be a great communicator. An effective leader talks about their ideas but also speaks to your emotions. If your audience does not believe in your idea, it probably won't be understood and embraced.

The best communicators are great listeners and very good observers. A successful communicator can read people and their environment well. Your message is not about the messenger, it is about meeting the needs and expectations of those listening to your message.

According to Mike Myatt from Forbes magazine, there are principles consistent with being an excellent communicator. I have highlighted some of them for your use.

1. Do not speak with a forked tongue. People will not open up to someone they do not trust. We cannot demand trust, it must be earned. Those listening to you will forgive many things where there is truth but will rarely forgive anything when trust is not present.
2. Get personal with your message. The more personal and engaging the message the more effective it will be. People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care.
3. Be specific with your message. Learn to speak with clarity. Simple and to the point is always better than complicated and confusing. Everyone's time is valuable so cut to the chase and hit the high points.
4. Be a good listener. Know when to speak and when to listen. More knowledge is gained by keeping your lips shut and removing your ear wax than by having the floor and constantly talking.

5. Have an open mind. Be willing to understand an opposing view and be genuinely curious about it instead of trying to convince someone to change their mind. Listening to differing opinions helps challenge you and stretch your mind.

6. When you speak, know what you are talking about. Be sure to have a good command of your topic. Most people will stop listening if they feel you do not know what you are talking about, don't fake it.



Most importantly, remember, communication is not about you and your opinions. It is about helping others by meeting their needs and understanding and adding value to their world.

We as Lions need to continually improve our leadership skills to better serve those looking to us for guidance. One of the ways we can accomplish this is through better communication. Communication is not something that comes naturally to everyone and we need to keep practicing our skills. The tips listed above are a good way to keep improving and becoming better Leaders and Communicators.



The 2018-2019 PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors, during its first meeting August 4 in Harrisburg, approved the tentative schedule for the 2019 MD-14 State Convention at the Kalahari Resorts and Conventions facility in Pocono Manor:

Veteran convention attendees will note several changes in the format of this year's convention. These changes were made at the request of members seeking to cut the length and expense of the convention. Changes being made include:

- The official opening of the convention will now take place Friday morning rather than at the start of the Necrology Service, which is held after several convention functions have already been held.
- Combining the PA Counsellors (Past District Governors) Banquet previously held on Friday night of the convention and the Honors Banquet previously held on Sunday night into one event. The banquets are designed to include essentially the same group of attendees. Combining the banquets into one event will hopefully result in a larger number of Lions and guests attending the event. Combining the banquets into one event will also afford attendees a cost savings of one less meal function, as well as the opportunity to avoid the need for a Sunday evening hotel accommodation.
- Dispensing with the first Business Session held Saturday morning during previous conventions and handling all convention business in one session Sunday morning. This change will open up the convention schedule for an additional seminar.
- Changing the former Saturday morning breakfast to a Saturday luncheon to negate the need for an early-morning gathering. This change will also allow us to focus more attention on both the Lioness of the Year award winners and the PA All State Band.

Again, these changes were made at the request of Lions who took the time at the last two state convention to complete Comments cards and otherwise express their desire for modifications in the state convention schedule.

The State Office and future Council of Governors will evaluate the results of the revised schedule at the end of this year's state convention and potentially make additional changes for upcoming conventions.

We encourage all PA Lions, in particular those who attend the state convention, to provide constructive comments to the appropriate decision-making bodies.

We look forward to seeing everyone in May!
