No matter how you choose to serve, Lions matter now more than ever!




Past International Director Cindy Gregg "Sailing into a New Year"

"Challenges for a New Lions Year"



More than 1.4 million men and women around the world belong to the greatest humanitarian service organization, Lions Club International. That's less than 0.01 percent of the world population. Yet, Lions around the world have had a huge impact on the less fortunate. LCIF alone has provided more than \$1 billion in grants in just 50 years; add to that the incalculable billions in financial aid that more than 46,000 clubs have provided to their local communities over the last 101 years; the impact is immeasurable.

Here in Pennsylvania with 18,678 members in 687 clubs we make an impact every day. A quick review of reported MyLCI service projects shows significant activities in our communities, but less than 60% of our clubs file reports on MyLCI. Each month I review district newsletters and see even more activities being conducted. Why is it we can't get club secretaries and global service chairpersons to report their service projects on MyLCI? Did you know for every service project your club reports, Lions Clubs International uses that data to partner with foundations, the United Nations, other service organizations and governments to get matching funds, access to local communities and the ability to reach thousands of needy. According to MyLCI reports, very few of our clubs had meetings in Lions year 2017-2018. My first challenge to every club is to take 20 minutes on a quarterly basis and enter all your club meetings, service projects, fundraising activities, etc. That's less than two hours in an entire year, the payback to Lions Clubs International is huge as they continue their partnerships.

By now you have heard about Lions Clubs International's new Global Service cause for Childhood Cancer (formally Pediatric Cancer). As Lions Clubs International continues to find global partners in this cause, the Lions of Pennsylvania have teamed up with The Four Diamonds Foundation to raise \$100,000 this year and hopefully every year. The Four Diamonds Foundation provides support to families covering 100 percent of all medical expenses related to cancer care not covered by insurance for eligible Four Diamonds children. There are various levels and methods of giving, look for flyers from your District Governor or check out www.FourDiamonds.org/PALions. My second challenge to every Lion is to donate \$6.00 to this cause, raising over \$112,000; additionally each club to donate \$100, raising another \$67,800. What a huge difference Lions could make in the lives of children with cancer and aiding their families with expenses.

My next challenge? Campaign 100, Lions Clubs International Foundation's three year, \$300 million Capital Campaign to boost giving around the world. My challenge, for each Pennsylvania Lion to become a \$20 Contributing Member raising over \$373,000 each year; and for each club to donate \$500 each year for an additional annual donation of \$343,000. Total contribution over three years – more than \$2.1 million. If additional individual, club and district contributions are added, there is a potential of \$1 million a year. What a huge impact Pennsylvania could make. See your club's LCIF chairperson, your district LCIF chairperson, or your District Governor for more details.

What's next, a challenge to the Lions of Pennsylvania, the Brady Buggy Wagon. The Brady Buggy Wagon is a project of the Hugs for Brady Foundation that is being embraced by many organizations. The Brady Buggy is a wagon built to allow children undergoing treatments more freedom by safely transporting a child and an IV pole as one unit throughout a hospital. The cost of a Lions Brady Buggy is \$1000. My challenge, each zone throughout the Multiple District team together and purchase one Brady Buggy for a local hospital. That's 138 hospitals that would benefit and the countless children who would enjoy the Brady Buggy make this a huge gift. The cost to each club, between \$200 and \$300 depending on the number of clubs in each zone. Go to www.hugsforbrady.org, your District Governor's Partner in Service, or your District Governor for more details.

The costs of these financial challenges, \$26 per member and less than \$800 per club each year. The impact we can make in our communities and across the world is immeasurable. The world of Lions would know that Pennsylvania cares.

Finally, I can't leave you without a membership challenge. At one time there were more than 30,000 Pennsylvania Lions. With less than 19,000 now it's harder to meet the growing needs of our communities. As our clubs age, the amount of service to our communities shrinks. As our membership ages our clubs have the ability to perform less service. Take a look at all the good your club currently does in your community; what will happen to your community in 10, 15 or 20 years as your club slowly fades away. Who is going to step in to support the local sports teams, eye screening, holiday parades and celebrations, fairs, bingos and the hundreds of other projects across our communities? Each Lion needs to bring one guest not to a meeting but to a service project, the club needs to embrace that visitor, talk to them about your club, its services, the good you do for the community. Then invite them to a meeting and offer membership. My challenge, each club ends the 2018-2019 Lions year with a plus two, one being a woman to celebrate our organization's first woman president.





MD-14 STATE COUNCIL of LIONS CLUBS CONVENTION 96th Annual Convention - May 16 to May 19, 2019 Kalahari Resorts & Conventions, 250 Kalahari Blvd., Pocono Manor, PA 18349

The 2018-2019 PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors, during its first meeting August 4 in Harrisburg, approved the tentative schedule for the 2019 MD-14 State Convention at the Kalahari Resorts and Conventions facility in Pocono Manor:

Veteran convention attendees will note several changes in the format of this year's convention. These changes were made at the request of members seeking to cut the length and expense of the convention. Changes being made include:

- The official opening of the convention will now take place Friday morning rather than at the start of the Necrology Service, which is held after several convention functions have already been held.
- Combining the PA Counsellors (Past District Governors) Banquet previously held on Friday night of the convention and the Honors Banquet previously held on Sunday night into one event. The banquets are designed to include essentially the same group of attendees. Combining the banquets into one event will hopefully result in a larger number of Lions and guests attending the event. Combining the banquets into one event will also afford attendees a cost savings of one less meal function, as well as the opportunity to avoid the need for a Sunday evening hotel accommodation.
- Dispensing with the first Business Session held Saturday morning during previous conventions and handling all convention business in one session Sunday morning. This change will open up the convention schedule for an additional seminar.
- Changing the former Saturday morning breakfast to a Saturday luncheon to negate the need for an early-morning gathering. This change will also allow us to focus more attention on both the Lioness of the Year award winners and the PA All State Band.

Again, these changes were made at the request of Lions who took the time at the last two state convention to complete Comments cards and otherwise express their desire for modifications in the state convention schedule.

The State Office and future Council of Governors will evaluate the results of the revised schedule at the end of this year's state convention and potentially make additional changes for upcoming conventions.

We encourage all PA Lions, in particular those who attend the state convention, to provide constructive comments to the appropriate decision-making bodies.

We look forward to seeing everyone in May!

JULY-AUG-SEPT 2018 ISSUE OF THE PRIDE

HEADLINE: House of Delegates session set for Nov. 3

The 2018-2019 PA State Council of Lions Clubs' Council of Governors, at its first meeting in August, approved the convening of a session of the Multiple District 14 House of Delegates on Saturday, Nov. 3, 2018.

The Delegates' session will start at 1:30 p.m. and run through approximately 3 p.m. The session will be held at the Hilton Garden Inn Indiana at IUP, 714 Pratt Drive, Indiana, PA, in conjunction with second 2018-2019 State Council meeting.

The purpose of the Delegates' session is to select a preferred candidate for the high office of International Director of Lions Clubs International during LCI's 102nd annual convention in Milan, Italy.

The name of the preferred candidate and that of any other qualified candidate who wishes to be considered will then be placed on the ballot for a special election to be held Saturday, Feb. 2, 2019 in conjunction with the third 2018-2019 State Council meeting at the Altoona Grand Hotel, 1 Sheraton Drive, Altoona, PA.

The Delegates' session is open to any MD-14 Lion who wishes to attend, but the only Lions eligible to vote during the session are the 51 delegate listed below, who had previously been appointed by the District Governor of their respective district.

Delegates for the special election in February 2019 will be determined in accordance with MD-14 policy, under which each club in good standing is entitled to one delegate for every 10 members on their roster as of July 1, 2018. Delegate forms for the special election will be distributed by the MD-14 Office shortly after the conclusion of the House of Delegates session in November 2018.

The candidate receiving the highest number of votes during the special election in February 2019 will then be forwarded to Lions Clubs International as Multiple District 14's endorsed candidate for the high office of International Director.

Lion/Lioness Sara added PAWS awards to individuals recommended by the Leos where extra acts of kindness were done or efforts were made beyond expectations.



Dr. Gump presented an informative presentation on profound deafness at the PLHRF dinner at the State Council Meeting on August 3, 2018. He stated that profound deafness has great effect on a child's learning ability and on his/her entire life.



PROMOTING HEARING HEALTH

As a Lion, a member of the Lower Paxton Township Lions Club and a licensed Audiologist, I also currently serve on the Board of the Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation as one of 14-T's representatives.

The objectives of PLHRF, which was founded in 1979, are to initiate and support research on hearing problems by providing grants within the state of Pennsylvania.

During the past year I have started speaking to Lions Clubs about promoting hearing health and the great work of the PLHRF.

It is estimated that 36 million American adults report some degree of hearing loss. Here are a few facts that were recently reported.

- According to a document released by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, workers exposed to
 acceptable levels of both noise and ototoxicants face an increased risk of hearing loss. The risk of hearing
 loss in increased when workers are exposed to certain chemicals while working around elevated noise levels.
 Occupations that may have high noise and ototoxicant exposure include printing, painting, construction,
 firefighting, weapon firing, pesticide spraying and many manufacturing industries.
- Researchers from the CDC's National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health released a report, "A significant percentage of the workers studied have hearing difficulty, high blood pressure and high cholesterol that could be attributed to noise at work. This study provides further evidence of an association of occupational noise exposure with high blood pressure and high cholesterol, and the potential to prevent these conditions if noise is reduced.
- A study from the Journal of the American Medical Association-Otolaryngology found that in a group of adults that said they had a lot of trouble hearing were almost twice as likely to suffer an accidental injury. Regular hearing screening and increased awareness are suggested as prevention measures.
- From a recent Japanese study, current smokers were up to 70% more likely to develop high frequency hearing loss than non-smokers.




