I also want to remind everyone of our continued focus on supporting the five global service areas: vision, hunger, the environment, childhood cancer and diabetes during the upcoming year.

In case you aren't aware, LCIF recently announced a new way to support local humanitarian efforts beginning in July 2018 through District and Club Community Impact Grants. Applications and information are now available online.

Did your club maintain its membership or have a net growth, conduct at least three service projects, and did your club promote these events and activities in your community during the 2017 - 2018 year? If so, you should check online, and complete the application, to see if your club is eligible for the Club Excellence Award before August 31, 2018.

Finally, as we enter into our second century of service as Lions, I want to challenge each Lion to work towards truly living up to our motto, "We Serve."

Perhaps you could bring in a recent past president of a successful club to share thoughts and experiences or recent past club secretaries and treasurers to offer insight on how to best help the club president.

Does every Lions' leader in your district have a 30 second "Welcome to My World" presentation for prospective members? A breakout session pairing up your incoming officers of all levels could be valuable in helping them develop this presentation. The role of all club leaders includes growing their club and keeping the club vital and strong by injecting new blood and ideas.

As you can see the list of possibilities is endless. Training should not be a dreaded event that no one has interest in and in today's society every minute is precious and nobody wants to waste their free time. Create innovative titles for your presentations, keep your presenters fresh and don't always use the same person. A fresh perspective can make all the difference. Be sure your presenters are knowledgeable and **CURRENT** on the knowledge they are providing. Have Fun!! The best compliment you can get is "I can't wait for the next training, I'm going to tell everyone at my club what they missed."

"Membership Growth - Younger Members"

PDG Ronnie Martin was a speaker at our recent PA Lions State Convention. If you missed the membership presentation, you missed a chance to interact with someone who knows how to start clubs and grow our Lions. Many of you are already familiar with him as he has helped many of our districts start new clubs in the past year or so. If you are serious about starting a new club, please contact LCI and ask for the assistance of a new club specialist such as PDG Ronnie to help you. This column is a recap of PDG Ronnie's presentation.



We all talk about how hard it is to bring in younger members. Younger people want to volunteer. They want to get things done. They don't want to go to meetings. When you ask them to join, do so in 25 words or less. Most don't carry cash or have checking accounts, so you need to be equipped to take credit card payments. When you do attract younger members, put them to work right away. Listen to their ideas and let them try something your club wouldn't normally take on. We need to get rid of the "we've always done it this way" and "we tried that years ago and it didn't work" attitudes and be willing to change how we think and do things if we want to attract younger members and keep them.

We need to rethink the age of these younger members. Think about the age group 10 years younger than those in your club. We tend to think about attracting those in their 20s or 30s. If your club has an average age of 60, those age groups might not be what you should look at. Try attracting members younger than your club but closer in age. Your interests might be more in line and the change you will face to attract and keep them might not be as difficult.

Membership growth is the responsibility of every Lion. Who have YOU asked recently to join Lions? Everyone deserves one ask. If they are interested but can't join at this time, give them time and ask again. Ask everyone in your community. Start by asking them what they would do to improve the community. Then ask them if they'd like to be part of the solution. You should ask your friends, family, neighbors, hair stylist, mail delivery person, business people you deal with, fire chief, police chief, member of borough council, mayor and the list goes on and on. Anyone you come into contact with is worthy of being asked. Remember to tell them that it is an honor to be asked to join.

Though you should stress our service projects, what we do in our communities, when you ask someone to become a Lion, remember to tell them that there is a financial obligation. Our dues support the Lions operation in Oakbrook so that all donations go to helping those in need. Lions Clubs International has a four-star rating on Charity Navigator, the highest rating there is. This can be important to someone who wants to make sure their donations go to the cause, not to high overhead.

When you talk to a prospective Lion, let them know that we do more than collect eyeglasses. We do service projects in our community, provide scholarships for students, supply instructors with materials needed for their students to be successful, and, yes, we support Leader Dogs for the Blind. You can add those projects that your club is responsible for, so they know what we do for their/your community.

Proudly wear your Lions pin at all times and have an elevator speech ready in case you are asked about it.

Thank you for ALL you do in the name of Lions to serve others!

LAS VEGAS INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION



Exciting days are ahead for PA Lions heading to the 101st anniversary celebration of Lionism at the International Convention in Las Vegas, NV, June 29 through July 3, 2018. Our Pennsylvania delegation hotel is the MGM Grand Hotel, South Las Vegas Boulevard.

All registrants must pick up their name badge onsite in Las Vegas at all LCI hotels as NO badges will be mailed in advance. All convention registrants will receive an official name badge, souvenir medallion, official convention program and one ticket for the International Show.

Many Lions and Leos who pre-registered early and paid their \$25 payment have committed to serve in the same community as Melvin Jones did 100 years ago by participating in the Convention

Service Project. Hands-on opportunities, such as urban farm gardening, park clean-ups, hygiene kit assembly and food bank packing sessions will be available throughout the convention.

The spectacular **International Parade of Nations** is scheduled to step off on **Saturday, June 30** at 8:30 AM, lead by the Pennsylvania All-State Band. A convention shuttle will be provided to the parade step off. The mile long parade will proceed down 4th Street, past the judges and VIP review stands, terminating near the Fremont Street Experience. Participants may decide to remain there to explore the old casinos and watch street performers or proceed to the dispersal area on Casino Center Boulevard returning to MGM Grand.

The **International Show** is set for **Saturday, June 30**, at 7:00 PM in the MGM Grand Garden Arena. Lions will be treated to special performances by Cirque Dreams Jungle Fantasy. Immediately following the International show at 9:00 PM in the MGM Grand Premier Ballroom, MD-14 PA will host their **Cocktail Reception featuring musical entertainment by the Pennsylvania All State Band.**

MD-16 New Jersey will be hosting the **Mid-Atlantic Breakfast** on **Sunday, July 1 in the MGM Grand.** The plated breakfast will feature orange juice, coffee, tea, Danish, pastries, and "Southern Coast Scramble," which is free range eggs, Vermont cheddar cheese, O'Brien potatoes, blistered tomatoes and Benton's farm smoked bacon.

Sunday's July 1st Plenary Show will feature as guest speaker the multiple Emmy award winning chief medical correspondent for CNN, practicing neurosurgeon, **Dr. Sanjay Gupta**, as well as the LCI's Presidential Address, Flag Ceremony, International Parade results and nominations for Third Vice President.

The July 2nd Plenary Show will feature former **President George W. Bush**, the 43rd President of the United States and Founder of the George W. Bush Presidential Center, the Memorial Service and LCIF Session.

Tuesday, July 3, 10:00 – 1:00 is the Final Plenary Session when the 2018-2019 International President is installed, U.N. Flag Ceremony and the installation of 2018-2019 District Governors.

While in Las Vegas there will be plenty of great places to dine in the MGM Grand; be sure to try Emeril's New Orleans Fish House and the TAP Sports Bar. While visiting downtown; stop in and try the Garden Court Buffet at Main Street Station Hotel and Casino.

A trip to Las Vegas would not be complete without visits to the Bellagio Hotel and Casino. There you will see the fountain show in the Conservatory and the Botanical Garden. Also visit the Paris Hotel for the Eiffel Tower Experience. All visitors are encouraged to explore downtown and see what's left of "Old Vegas" to see the street performers and after dark....the light and sound show on the canopy over Freemont Street.

The 101st Celebration of Lionism will surely be one to remember!

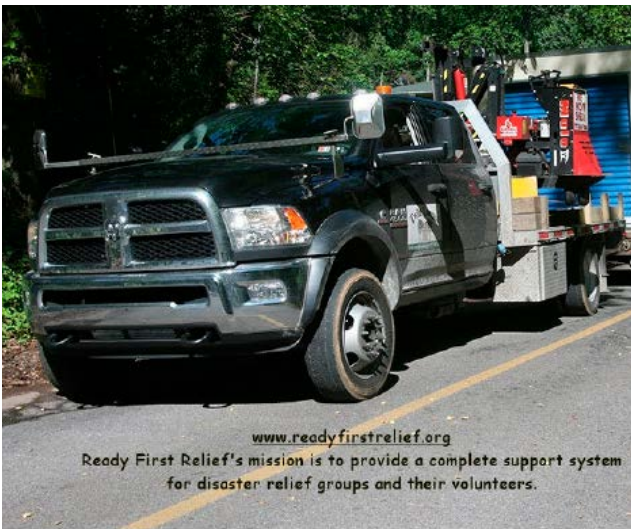
