



The mission of the Pennsylvania Lions Sight Conservation and Eye Research Foundation is to raise funds for eye and diabetic research projects and for equipment to be used in clinical procedures.

In the world 80% of blindness is preventable or reversible. It is only through research that someday we will find a cure for blindness.

The Foundation board members and the District chairpersons are available to present programs on eye research or diabetes to your club or other organizations. Contact the State Council (717-564-2586) for the name of a board member in your area.

Grant requests for research or clinical projects to be conducted in Pennsylvania are submitted to the chairperson of the board of directors of the Foundation. Each request is reviewed by an independent board of ophthalmologic or optometric doctors depending on the nature of the request. The recommendations of the doctors are then reviewed by the Foundation Board of Directors which meets quarterly to review and approve the grant requests. Board members serve without compensation.

The Foundation was founded in 1959 by a unanimous vote of the Pennsylvania State Council of Lions Clubs.

The Board of Directors consists of six Lions, two members from each region (west, central and east) in Pennsylvania. Board members are appointed by their respective District Governors and approved by the PA State Council.

Major contributions have been made to:

Wills Eye Institute, Philadelphia; Pennsylvania Lions Laser Center at the UPMC Eye and Ear Institute, Pittsburgh; Pennsylvania Lions Low Vision and Research Center, Hershey; Center for Molecular Ophthalmology at the University of Pennsylvania; Scheie Eye Institute and Molecular and Regulatory Biology Research Laboratory at the Pennsylvania College of Optometry, Salus University.

Funds for the Foundation are raised by the members of Lions, Lioness and Leo clubs. Each of the 17 districts in PA has a chairperson who solicits funds from each club in his/her district which are then forwarded to the Foundation treasurer, PID Robert W. Miller.

The board of directors of the Foundation has established a Memorial Endowment Fund. Only the interest from this fund is used for eye research; the principal remains intact. The Memorial Endowment Fund requires a contribution of \$500 or more to honor a Lion, Lioness, Leo, Lions Club or an individual in the community who has been interested in eye research.

"Your donation now might help your grandchild see in the future."

A blue certificate will be awarded to any club or individual making a contribution between \$500 and \$999.

A gold certificate will be awarded to any club or individual making a contribution of \$1,000 or more.

The criteria shown above applies to both the general fund and the Memorial Endowment Fund.

Grants of more than \$1,000,000 over ten years combat: diabetic retinopathy, macular degeneration, cataracts, glaucoma, retinitis pigmentosa, infectious eye disease, low vision in children, diabetic eve disease, retinal degeneration, detached retinas.

WORLD'S FIRST LEO CLUB - ABINGTON HIGH SCHOOL LEOS ARE BACK

The world's first **Leo Club at Abington High School, District 14-A**, is back and running strong. After several years of inactivity, PDG Ed Tustin inducted 62 members into the Leos on November 14. Under the direction of **Lion Mindy Katz**, and the sponsoring club, the **Hatboro Lions Club**, the necessary leadership will be provided to make this club one of the strongest. Hatboro President and Zone Chairman **Norma Evangelista** already has several members appointed to be liaisons to this Leo club.

This first Leo Club was started in 1957 by Lions Jim Graver and William Ernst of the Glenside Lions Club in Montgomery County. The club created the colors of the Leo emblem by using the colors of the high school – maroon and gold. They also created the acronym Leadership, Experience, Opportunity for the word LEO. As a result of the action of the two members of the Glenside Lions Club, today there are more than 160,000 members worldwide in 149 countries.



Lions Diabetes Education and Treatment Center at UPMC McKeesport

Editor's note: The following column appeared in the October 6, 2017 edition of the Mon Valley Independent and is reprinted by permission.

UPMC McKeesport (formerly McKeesport Hospital) houses the first Lions Diabetes Education and Treatment Center of its kind in the nation. Patients were once admitted into the hospital under a diagnosisrelated grouping. This grouping determined the patient's major diagnosis, as well as the patient's secondary diagnosis. Through the quality assurance and insight of clinical director Annette Karnash, R.N. at the time, the hospital determined that a large number of its patients' secondary diagnoses were related to diabetes and that their treatment for diabetes became priority. On September 23 of each year, the Lions **Diabetes Education and Treatment** Center at UPMC McKeesport continues to celebrate its many successes in diabetes-related treatment and education since 1993.

How did a project of this magnitude take form? In 1992, a unique partnership was formed with hospital officials and district governors Joseph Donkin and Clarence Thomas of Lions Clubs of Region 2 of District 14-B Lions in Allegheny County to begin a fundraising campaign to open the first Center at UPMC McKeesport. Through the Foundation's annual hospital invitational with matching pledges of support from District 14-B Lions and later supported by Westmoreland Lions in District 14-E, as well as Lions Clubs International. a total of \$162,000 was raised to open the Lions Diabetes Education and Treatment Center at UPMC

McKeesport. It became the first Center of its kind nationally with the Lions name under the direction of the late medical director Dr. Usman Ahmad. Because of its distinction and significant accomplishments, Dr. Ahmad and the Center have been focused in the Lions International Magazine on three occasions.

Once the Center opened, this partnership continued to raise funds annually to support medications for those with the inability to pay for treatment. This financial support amounts to approximately \$30,000 each year. In addition to medications, the Lions Fund has financially supported upgrades to the Lions Center Classroom and research projects through the University of Pittsburgh Diabetes Institute. Future plans are to further expand treatment and education into Westmoreland County. Partnerships are also being

developed to offer diabetes patients with health and fitness programs, in addition to the medications and classroom education already in place.

Diabetes impacts all of us internationally through our families and friends. Diabetes Awareness Month is in November each year, and it is this year's main focus of Lions Clubs International. Your donations are welcomed and put to good use to assist a number of patients who rely on their medications but cannot afford to pay for them. You can contact the Lions Diabetes Center at UPMC McKeesport at (412) 664-3055 or one of many Lions in your communities for additional assistance.

Lion Michele Matuch is a columnist for the Mon Valley Independent and a member of the Lions Diabetes Education and Treatment Center at UPMC McKeesport advisory board. Lion Matuch has served two terms each as president of the McKeesport and Mon River Fleet Specialty Lions clubs in District 14-B. Members of the **Christiana, 14-D, Avon Grove** and **Parkesburg Lions Club, 14-P,** joined together to fill a tractor trailer with supplies to ship to Houston after Hurricane Harvey. A 53-foot tractor trailer was filled with much needed supplies donated from across the community including Amish families and members of the American Legion. Included in the materials were diapers, medical equipment, crutches, canes and walkers. They also plan to collect items for victims in Florida and Puerto Rico affected by hurricanes.


